BILL GATES SR. TO SPEAK AT ROTARY CONVENTION

(SALT LAKE CITY) - William H. Gates Sr., co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, will discuss the vital role played by The Rotary Foundation and other charitable foundations in addressing the world's most pressing humanitarian needs on June 19 at the Salt Palace Convention Center.

He is expected to cite the success of Rotary's leadership in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, a public/private partnership spearheaded by Rotary, the World Health Organization, UNICEF and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Since 2000, The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation has invested \$150 million in the polio initiative. Most recently, the Gates Foundation contributed \$40 million to stem a serious polio outbreak in Nigeria and surrounding countries. The foundation also invested \$10 million in the development of more effective oral polio vaccines that have bolstered efforts in the remaining four polio-endemic countries.

Gates guides the vision and strategic direction of the foundation, which was established in 2000 through the merger of the William H. Gates Foundation and the Gates Learning Foundation. The foundation seeks to reduce inequities and improve lives around the world. Co-chairs are William H. Gates III, founder and chairman of Microsoft Corp., and his wife, Melinda French Gates.

Gates' talk at the Rotary International convention concludes a plenary session devoted to the Rotary Foundation. The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotary members to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace by addressing the roots causes of violence and strife, such as hunger, thirst, disease, poverty and illiteracy. The Rotary Foundation is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotary members and friends. Since 1947, the Rotary Foundation has awarded more than \$1.1 billion in humanitarian and educational grants, all administered by local Rotary clubs.
