RI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Since 1988, when polio eradication efforts began, Rotary International has been a spearheading partner in the fight to end the disease. Long-time Rotarians know the history well. There have been triumphs and setbacks. There have been times of rapid advances and times when progress has seemed slow. There have been times when the end seemed very near. But never has it been nearer than it is right now.

Before the campaign to eliminate polio, about 1,000 children a day -350,000 a year – were paralyzed by this terrible disease. These children were left to a life of struggle and disability, and often of social stigma. Today, only four countries are still polio-endemic, and annual cases of polio paralysis are down to about 1,000 a year.

We've come so far, yet the nature of the wild poliovirus means that if we slacken our efforts for even a moment, we'll soon see our hard work reversed. We have only two options: to press on with determination and faith until we succeed, or to lose everything we've invested and everything we've gained.

The generosity of Rotarians in responding to the call for help has been astounding. We've raised more than US\$600 million to support polio eradication in 122 countries. We've saved the lives of thousands of children through the polio vaccine and the vitamin supplements distributed with it, and we've saved countless more from the often-desperate realities of post polio paralysis.

Now we're in the final stretch of this long and difficult, but exhilarating, race. It's literally a question of choice – to win or lose, succeed or fail. Our partners around the world have recognized how critical this juncture is, and many have stepped in with added support, financial and practical. The recently announced grant of \$100 million from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is a resounding vote of confidence in polio eradication efforts. Their financial support will be invaluable in the months ahead, and their trust in Rotary is an honour to us all.

Many of you have already given so much to the battle against polio. Each of you is forever a part of history – part of Rotary's legacy and its gift to the world's children. Today, we call on all Rotarians – but especially on new Rotarians who have not been a part of campaigns in the past – to do what they can, to help in any way they can, to finish this fight once and for all.

BINGO

As mentioned last week, we received an email (see below) from the Bingo Association, mentioning a change in the Gaming Act.

January 5, 2008 Dear Members:

Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch in Victoria has issued a directive that Charity Volunteers can no longer perform the duties of a paymaster. Under the legislated 'Gaming Act', the duties of this position must be carried out by a registered gaming worker. This change of policy in Victoria has of course required RMBA to institute operational changes surrounding the paymaster duties within the bingo hall.

Under the certificates of affiliation, each member is required to promote their charity and spend time in the bingo hall. Therefore, several years ago, our member charities voted to cover the paymaster position on all bingo sessions to reduce the staffing costs and keep the bingo hall viable. As a result of this commitment, our charities have completed the time requirement for the 2007 to 2008 certificate of affiliation period. Therefore, it will not be necessary for a volunteer to be present at any session during the months of January, February and March 2008


As each member is still required to promote their charity and spend time in the bingo hall during each licensing period, a new attendance schedule commencing <u>April 1, 2008</u> to <u>March 31, 2009</u> will be circulated prior to the end of February. Please note that on the new schedule, the time commitment will be reduced as a result of this new change to the Gaming Act.

Please note that this legislative/operational change does not have any affect on your affiliation dollars.

On behalf of all the staff, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our members for the years of service performing the duties of a paymaster. Your assistance in this capacity has been immeasurable and a major contributing factor in our remaining a viable hall.

As a result, nobody has Bingo duty for the months of January, February and March 2008. We will let you know what will happen after that, as soon we get more information. Peter
