Dear fellow Rotarians,

Mohandas Gandhi once said, "If we are to teach real peace in this world, and if we are to carry on a real war against war, we shall have to begin with the children."

What Gandhi understood so well was simply this: that anger and hatred, arguments and differences, rivalries and quarrels are not inherited or innate. They are learned. Children who see hate, learn hate. But children who see sharing and love, learn sharing and love.

Each of us has the opportunity to become great through our Rotary service. Let us all be sure that this is an opportunity that we seize.

Our Guest Speaker was Derrick Keist, who spoke about the Speed Watch Program.



The Speed Watch mission statement is "to reduce speeding in neighbourhoods, through an awareness program operated by neighbours, for neighbours".

Derrick advised that his been working on getting funding for a Radar Sentry Display Unit, which is a mobile vehicle speed display trailer designed to promote highway safety and reduce speed related accidents. The approximate cost is \$15,000. This will enable secure unattended operation with data logging capabilities. It is quick and easy to set up.

The volunteers' role is to note problem license plates so that a warning letter can be sent. A letter advising the owner of the speed the vehicle was being driven when clocked and how much the fine would have been if a ticket was issued, is sent to the owner encouraging them to slow down.

Derrick also spoke on Crime Free Multi-Housing, which is a program to encourage property owners to properly check out their tenants prior to signing the rental agreement. By being designated as part of the program, there is cost savings of up to 75% of the Business License fee. This can equate to as much as a \$2,000 savings for the property owner. He advised that he had completed a CPTED analysis on a problem apartment complex (Northumberland Strata on Fraser Street) that shows it negatively effects the surrounding properties for a one-mile radius. This is the type of property that needs to be involved in the Crime Free Multi-Housing program.

Speed Watch is a community-based volunteer program designed to help reduce speed-related crashes by making drivers more aware of the actual speeds they are traveling. Volunteers, trained by the police, use portable radar equipment and an electronic digital board to monitor speeds in neighbourhoods where local residents have reported incidents of unsafe speed to the police. Often these are school and playground zones. Drivers get instant feedback, as their speed is displayed on the reader board as they pass by. The volunteers keep records and return these to the police to help with enforcement planning.
