LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Our Guests today were Irena Shantz, Dave Boyce, visiting Rotarian Malcolm Kennedy from the Coquitlam Sunrise Club, and returning Rotarians Lindsay Hendy and Val Spurrell.

Announcements:

There will be 3 sessions of the 4 Way Test program held on Wednesday September 9th at Blue Mountain Elementary School for 90 students. First session starts at 8:15 am.

Marco told us what a great day they had at the horseback ride and BBQ on Saturday. There was a good turnout and everyone had a good time.

Winefest organization is going well but we need to get more tickets sold. Everyone is asked to sell four tickets or more if possible.

Marco thanked Brian Bekar for the success of the membership meeting he organized the previous week. We had a good turnout with a number of the attendees wanting to join the club.

Rotary Moment - Wheel Emblem

Terry Becker told us that the Rotary emblem was designed by a Chicago native, Montague Bear. The wheel consists of 6 spokes, 24 cogs and a keyway. It was adopted in 1923 as the official logo of Rotary.

Gordy introduced our Guest Speaker, Bob Paddon of Translink.

Mr. Paddon came from Ontario, then moved to Alberta where he worked on the pipelines. He moved to BC, and became the Vice President of Communications for BC Hydro. He was involved when Geoff Clayton and the ARMS group (Alouette



River Management Society) met with Hydro successfully over the South Alouette River issue. It was the first time BC Hydro considered down stream benefits. Mr. Paddon then became the Vice President Corporate/Public Affairs for Translink. A father of five, he is a man who really cares about his job.

Translink is working on a very aggressive public transportation plan. They have been investing in the region for five years (including the Golden Ears Bridge and the Canada Line).

There will be drastic cuts in the region beginning with service cuts in bus service next year bringing back 1970's service standards. Efficiency is generally above average compared to Toronto or Chicago. Translink spends a bit more on fuel and has a bit lower ridership. In 2007, the International Bus Benchmarking Group compared 12 cities around the world and ranked our bus service third in their ability to control administrative costs.

West Coast Express ridership is rising. The net operating cost decreased 85% from .16 to .02 per km. Improvements result from constant monitoring and measurement. They have ordered more cars for the West Coast Express and are looking at some options which are very viable to expand services but not at this time.

He spoke of executive compensation. Their benchmark is made up of private, quasi private and public sectors. The 2009 base salary ranges and executive salaries were frozen due to recessionary times.

The subsidy burden of public transportation is covered by property tax levies, hydro levy, fuel tax revenue (12% at the pumps), and parking sales taxes. This equates to approximately a \$330 per year per household contribution.

Translink's funding priorities are to maintain their current assets and existing services. If expansion is prioritized there is the risk of allowing the existing system to decay. There are a number of risks to be mindful of including the need for bigger stations and development of the Evergreen Line.

The proposed Maintenance and Repair Centre for Ridge Meadows, a heavy duty maintenance yard working in conjunction with BCIT, is still planning to move forward but at a slower rate.

Translink will be installing counters to look at the efficiency of routes. The 60' expanded buses are required at peak periods, but community shuttles could be used in off peak times to save fuel costs. The Federal government is funding \$70M for gates and Smartcards to control "free ridership". There is roughly 6.7 % lost revenue on Translink, and fines are not a deterrent.

The capital cost outlay per kilometre to construct the Skytrain is very high (\$100M per km), but the operating costs are low. The cost to construct the Canada Line was \$2 billion. The estimated cost for the Evergreen Line is \$1.4 billion. The railcars are \$4M each with a life span of 20 - 25 years.
