ROTARY MOMENT - Anil

Anil spoke briefly on the establishment of the Rotary Foundation.

I n 1917, RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed that an endowment be set up "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International. Five Trustees, including Klumph, were appointed to "hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its property... as a single trust, for the furtherance of the purposes of Rotary International."

Gordy introduced our Guest Speaker, MLA Rich Coleman.



MLA Coleman has served as governor of the B.C. Kinsmen, president of the Aldergrove Chamber of Commerce, and as a director on several volunteer boards. He was awarded Rotary's highest honour, the Paul Harris Fellowship, and received a Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2003. Before his election to the Legislative Assembly, Rich ran a real estate management and consulting company. He is also a former member of the RCMP and a security specialist. Rich and his wife, Michele, live in Aldergrove and have two adult children. He has been the Minister of Housing & Social Development since June, 2008. He has served as the Minister responsible for Housing since 2005.

MLA Coleman began by telling us that he wasn't with us to talk politics, but to tell us how Rotary has touched his life. He was very honoured to receive the Paul Harris Fellowship award.

Rich came from a large family. At 17 years of age, he was sponsored for a Rotary Adventure that took him across Canada by train. It was a life changing experience that allowed him to see Canada and meet different people. Later

his sister Anne had the opportunity for a Rotary Adventure in the Philippines.

Rich explained that he was anaemic as a child, and had to wear special shoes with a brace. There was some question on whether he might have had polio. As a result he is very cognisant of the tremendous work Rotary has done in its effort to eradicate Polio throughout the world.

He advised that we've had the largest immunization program in Canadian history this year due to the H1N1 virus, but that it's nothing compared to the one day immunization of 127,000,000 children that was done in India to further the eradication of polio. Nothing has ever mobilized people and taught volunteerism, the life blood of communities, like the Rotary National Immunization Days. Since 1995 to date over two billion children have been vaccinated. Rich noted that because of Rotary 4,000,000 children are alive today.

Throughout his presentation, he kept emphasizing the importance of Rotarians and Rotary's volunteer work locally and around the world, and thanked us for the work we do.

He then referred to the local activities that Rotary Clubs undertake for their communities. When he was young they did not have money for all the kids in the family to take swimming lessons. One of the Penticton Rotary Clubs initiatives was to provide swimming lessons for entire families for \$2. They recognized the importance for children

to learn to swim and the recreational benefit for the families. As a result of the \$2 his parent paid, five people are alive today.

He then told us his 7-11 story.

Every time he drives by 7-11 it makes him smile because it reminds him of Rotary. Room 711 was where the first Rotary meeting was held on February 23, 1905. In 1989 the building was scheduled for demolition. Recognizing the historical importance of the room, it was dismantled piece by piece, salvaging the original interior, including doors and radiators. In 1993, the Board of Directors of Rotary International set aside a permanent home for the restored Room 711 on the 16th floor of RI World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois.

Gordy asked Rich to outline a few of the accomplishments of his Ministry. Rich advised that they wrote the housing strategy four years ago. Their program began three years ago and since then they've provided rent assistance for 9,000 families, focused on the homeless and mental heath issues, tripled the number of shelters, put outreach workers in 46 communities and purchased 46 buildings to provide addiction support.
