SHELTERBOX IN HAITI

After 10 years of bringing aid to thousands of disaster victims, ShelterBox faced its most daunting challenge yet after a powerful earthquake rocked Haiti on 12 January, plunging the struggling nation into one of the worst humanitarian crises on record.

The quake, the nation's strongest in more than 200 years, killed at least 200,000 people and left more than one million homeless and in desperate need of food and shelter. The ground support that ShelterBox deployed days after the quake struck was unmatched by anything the organization had done before.

"This is the largest, quickest, and most complex deployment in our history. We organized across four countries to get ShelterBoxes to the people of Haiti quickly," says John Leach, head of operations.

With most of the capital, Port-au-Prince, flattened, hospitals were in dire need of shelter for victims. Hundreds of tents were used as emergency shelter for postoperative patients.

Founded by Tom Henderson, of the Rotary Club of Cober Valley Helston, England, in 1999, ShelterBox is a Rotarian- and Rotary club supported non-profit that brings shelter, water, and comfort to victims of disaster and conflict. Each 49-gallon box is packed with necessities such as tents big enough for 10 people, blankets, water purification tablets, cooking supplies, and tools.

At press time, more than 10,000 containers had been distributed in Haiti. In the last decade, ShelterBox has responded to more than 100 crises in over 60 countries, with support from Rotary clubs around the world.

SHELTERBOX VILLAGE IN MAPLE RIDGE

A clarion call went out to have a "Minga," an Ecuadorian term for an urgent call to the community to work for the benefit of others. The citizens of Maple Ridge, Pitt Meadows and beyond heard the call and responded beyond the wildest expectations of the organizing committee. The demonstration Shelterbox village in Memorial Park provided a realistic picture of what kind of help your donation would provide for the victims in Haiti. Your donation was used to purchase Shelterboxes that were delivered by Rotary volunteers directly to the victims, teaching the locals how to set up the ten person tent and how to best utilize all the other contents of the box. No middlemen, no bureaucracy; minimal overhead and thus maximum benefit for the Haitians!

During the weekend of January 22, 2010, the MeadowRidge Rotary club, the Haney Rotary club, the Kiwanis and Scouts of Canada joined hands to put together an event that all participants will remember as a prime example of how our fellow citizens could share in the spirit of a Minga. A terrific band, "Newhouse," presented a free concert.

The event raised over \$50,000 or enough for 50 Shelter Boxes.
