ROTARY MOMENT:

Terry Becker informed the club about the role played by Rotary clubs during World War II. Some clubs stepped up their efforts, while others were forced to disband. 1942 saw the formation of UNESCO arising out of Rotarians calling for a conference to promote international educational and cultural exchanges. Rotary also participates in UN delegations by sending observers to major meetings and covering UN matters in it's publications.

Winston Churchill, was known to have given the Rotary organisation public recognition for it's worldwide humanitarian efforts.

GUEST SPEAKER: Jack Rae –District Chair, World Committee Services

Marco introduced the speaker and gave the club some information his background. Jack was born and raised in Vancouver, but has also lived in various other cities in Canada. He has also lived in Kenya and Zimbabwe in Africa. He joined the RCMP in 1960 and retired in 1993. He has now settled in Surry, BC.

Jack joined Rotary in 2002 and was appointed to the position of District Chair for the World Services committee for 2010-2011. He has been involved with several projects and matching grants in Africa, particularly in Kenya and Zimbabwe through Rotary's "Access Programme" - African/Canadian Education".

He was also instrumental in getting four clubs in Surrey to pair together to complete a project in Haiti. He emphasised the importance of Rotary putting together a co-ordinated effort in these sorts of projects, to prevent duplication and a waste of resources. Rotary was putting together a database of project opportunities for clubs to become involved in. He mentioned the Rotary "Reach Out to Africa" programme and suggested that a safari to Africa, by a group of Rotarians, would help to promote and educate people as to the needs in these countries.

A brief discussion was held on other International Services Programmes, including the Future Vision Plan, which commenced 1st July 2010, a pilot project for 3 years. Some of the changes to the GSE programme were highlighted e.g.: changes in age restrictions and limitation of vocations. More information go to www.Rotary.org.

The Imagination Library

This Rotary supported project is gaining steam across North America and there are now over 70 communities across Canada that sponsor Imagination Library projects.

A community (in our case, sponsor) must make the program accessible to all preschool children in their area. The community (sponsor) pays for the books and mailing, promotes the program, registers the children, and enters the information into the database. From there The Dollywood Foundation of Canada takes over and manages the system to deliver the books to the home.

Ineke, Peter and Matt et al have been researching this opportunity and strongly suggest we engage in this as an ongoing, multi-year project and this has received very positive support from the club generally.
