GUEST SPEAKER : SGT MARC ALEXANDER – Newly implemented Impaired Driving Rules in BC.

Marc has been resident in Maple ridge since 1985 and employed by the RCMP for 30 years, the last 25 of which he has served as a traffic officer. He has had postings to Maple Ridge during the years 1992-1999 and later 2005 – 2007.



Currently he is 2nd in charge of the BC Traffic Services. For the last 8 months he has concentrated on finalising the new Impaired Driving Legislation recently implemented on September 20, 2010. The legislation begins with the reduction of blood alcohol limits for impaired driving to 0.05, followed by the imposition of heavy penalties.

He explained how the aim of the new legislation was to give traffic officers “road –side” tools for screening of drivers, thereby greatly reducing the time, cost and manpower required to prosecute traffic offenders. More importantly the entire procedure is able to be completed without the need for court intervention. The process is aimed at being Swift, Clear and Severe and penalties are imposed right at the roadside, including vehicle impoundment, driving bans and heavy fines.

He highlighted the reasons for these drastic measures and the fact that the previous legislation in place failed to create a deterrent against drinking and driving. Recent statistics show that 133 people are killed in road accidents each year, as a result of impaired driving.

Finally the new legislation also extends to non- alcohol related impounds for speeding, stunting, street-racing and driving while under a prohibition.

President Lynda thanked the speaker and allowed members to ask questions after the closing of the meeting.

BIVALENT ORAL POLIO VACCINE DELIVERS POWERFUL BLOW

The bivalent oral polio vaccine (bOPV) is proving to be a potent weapon in the global battle to eradicate the disease.

Developed to stop transmission of the type 1 and type 3 wild polioviruses simultaneously, bOPV was introduced in all four polio-endemic countries -- Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan -- in late 2009 and early 2010.

It has helped reduce the incidence of polio in India to 39 cases as of 26 October, compared to 498 for the same period in 2009. The number of cases in Nigeria has fallen to 8 from 382 for that period.
