POLIO RETURNS TO CRIPPLE ANGOLA

Sad news: Polio had been eradicated in Angola in 2002 in spite of the civil war. However the widespread poverty, poor sanitation and a less than diligent vaccination program for the children born after the year 2000 has created once again a susceptible population and it took only the arrival of some workers from India carrying the virus to cause an outbreak in the capital of Angola, Luanda among 32 children that were not vaccinated.

In the meantime that same virus has spread to the Democratic Republic of Congo and the neighbouring Congo and attacked 93 more children.

The Angolan government has pledged to vaccinate all Angola's 5.6 million children under the age of five by the end of this year.

But tackling the polio resurgence will take more than just vaccinations.

Health officials also face the difficult job of bringing clean water to more households and building infrastructure for sanitation and water treatment, since polio is highly contagious and is transmitted through feces.

During rainy season in the slums of Luanda, water floods the streets and forms muddy puddles that pose a health threat to neighbourhood children.

These areas also suffer severe shortages of drinking water.

The luckier households have access to public taps, others spend much of their income on bottled water.

Bill Gates has publically endorsed the huge contribution being made by Rotary International towards the eradication of polio in the world.

On a sad note Marco announced that there had been some reports of polio outbreaks in Angola.

GUEST SPEAKERS : "ANNUAL DUCK SPLASH"



3 members from the North Vancouver Rotary club came to our meeting to give members a bit of insight into the holding of a "Duck Race" as a Rotary fundraising event and to promote this year's race.

The club held its first duck race in the spring of 1988. The idea was presented to club members the year before and took a full year to plan. In that year \$62,000.00 was raised and the winner won a vehicle.

This year is their 15th race, and is now called the annual "Great Duck Splash". It will be held on April 10, 2011. All proceeds go towards the Lions Gate Hospital Foundation, North Shore Rescue, North Shore Neighbourhood House, North Shore Crisis Services Society, and smaller community projects.

16,000 rubber ducks will be dropped from a helicopter and then make their way along the Capilano River. When reaching the end of the course the winning ducks will be rescued by 9 Labrador retrievers. The lucky winner will win a cruise and there are many other exciting prizes.

The event always proves to be a great family outing with a variety of activities including face painting, food sales etc.
