WHY THE ROTARY YEAR BEGINS 1 JULY

Ever wonder why the Rotary year begins 1 July? The International Convention initially played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910. The 1911-12 fiscal year also related to the convention, beginning with the first day of the 1911 convention on 21 August.

At its August 1912 meeting, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs'

finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention.

The executive committee concurred, and at its April 1913 meeting, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments. Even *The Rotarian* changed its volume numbering system to correspond to the fiscal year (beginning with vol. 5, July 1914).

Rotary continued to hold its annual conventions in July or August until 1917. Delegates to the 1916 event in Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, approved a resolution to hold future conventions in June, mainly because of the heat in cities where most of them occurred. The next one was held 17-21 June in Atlanta, Georgia.

The term "Rotary year" has been used to signify Rotary's annual administrative period since at least 1913.

An article in *The Rotarian* that July noted, "The Rotary year that is rapidly drawing to a close has been signalized by several highly successful joint meetings of Clubs that are so situated as to assemble together easily and conveniently."

Since the executive committee's decision in 1913, the end of the Rotary year has remained 30 June.

Val began by telling the club a bit about the community museum and how it differs from other regular museums.

A community museum aims to record the history and archives of the people, places and things of both years gone by those current in a community. Keeping the memories, materials and



artefacts of the community help to remember our unsung heroes. This includes amongst those in sport, politics, recreational, community and charity projects etc.

The museum is always under pressure to collect special and interesting artefacts, before they are dumped when nobody has

a use for them. Artefacts help to tell the stories of a community when the people are no longer alive to do so.

Some of the challenges faced by the museum include lack funding, insufficient staff and more importantly storage. The museum is basically funded by the Municipality and a very unreliable Gaming Grant. They also rely on donations of archives and doing some fundraising e.g. Haney Warf concerts in the summer.

In order to overcome the storage problems they have tried to use the museum's website and other social media options. As the website can not accommodate all the data, the public has access to photographs via *flickr*.

The museum takes material to the community by putting on displays and presentations to the public, schools etc. e.g. Haney Farmer's Market.

Schools, sporting groups and those involved in politics are particularly bad at retaining archives, minute books etc. Therefore the museum staff is proactive in offering to collect, sort and retain archives.
