And finally, Canadian Blood Services helps to educate health professionals and the public to ensure the Canadian blood supply is used wisely.

She said if not for the transfusions and the gifts of blood from so many caring individuals, she wouldn't be able to watch her son grow up.

FIRST ANNUAL ROTARY DUCK RACE WAS HUGE SUCCESS
