YOUNG ROTARIAN MODELS LEADERSHIP IN AUSTRALIA

uring her first year at college, Holly Ransom, a member of the Rotary Club of Crawley, Australia, noticed that a lack of role models was demoralizing her female friends.

"Unfortunately, if you're looking to the media, you're struggling for female role models other than celebrities going in and out of rehab," she says.

In 2009, she founded Women Who Lead, a nonprofit that aims to provide positive examples and foster leadership skills.

A year ago, she joined the Crawley club and learned that only 2 percent of Rotarians are under age 30, and 16 percent are women.

"I couldn't get those statistics out of my head," the 22-year-old says. She told David Goldstone, one of the club's charter members, that she wanted to get more involved; soon after, Ransom became presidentelect.

She'll take office in 2012-13, shortly after graduating from the University of Western Australia with a degree in law and economics.

"Our club members are so different in composition and mindset," she says. "It's invigorating to be a part of the energy in the room every time we're together."

- We have the upcoming District 50/50 Conference in Semiahmoo from June 1 to 3, 2012.
- Wine Fest is fast approaching and we have about a hundred ticket out there, and Peter needs the money to be collected and turned in ASAP. Also additional silent auction items needed. Lastly the Wine Fest committee is meeting right after the regular meeting.

Lynda Lawrence then introduced our guest speaker Dan Herbranson, Ridge Meadows RCMP detachment's Communications
Strategist and Training Coordinator.

We were given an interesting discussion on our local area's crime



statistics, showing that Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows reported crimes are down over past years, but then asked the question on if all crime is being reported? Ronnie then discussed with us the impressive volunteers we have, like the Citizens on Patrol. They discussed the recent "We Can't Help" campaign which is ongoing now, and we all received a copy of this campaign's brochure.

Dan then discussed the several reasons the police hear about why crime is not reported on, and informed us that often police do not catch the criminals on the specific crime reported by a citizen, but then the crime is solved afterwards, along with many more often, when the criminal is apprehended. He noted that if the crimes are not reported, then the criminal is not held accountable for those ones, and stolen property can not easily be returned to the rightful owners. Jim Coulter was thanked for his paper's support of the We Can't Help campaign and the distribution of this type of information. We were informed that policing now focuses on higher risk areas based on the reported crimes, and this is another reason all crimes should be reported in the first place.

There were then questions and answers.

Lynda Lawrence asked about chronic problems with homeless people sleeping on commercial property, and we were informed that this is a growing problem, and we should report this as often as it happens as the policing department does co-ordinate with bylaws to coerce movement of these people.

There were then a few members noting frustration with some of the problems in our area, and Dan noted that he was not happy to hear some of these frustrations, as he was not aware of these examples and plans to look into them.

Ken Paterson then shared an experience with us on a stolen bike of his son, that was reported, caused an insurance claim to be processed and funds received, and then got the bike back (enhanced by the person keeping) over a year later. The insurance company was then put into shock by Ken's son repaying the theft proceeds of about \$300.00, which did not appear to have ever happened before. (Nice that Rotarians can show the way.)

Dan was thanked for his presentation and informed of the book to be sent to Nunavut in his name.

50/50 was won by Debra MacRae, but she drew the 4 of diamonds, to the vocal disappointment by the other members.

We then all toasted the Queen and the meeting was adjourned.
