It was established in 1957 to show appreciation for contributions, and to encourage substantial ones, to what was then the Foundation's only program. Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships. Today, the recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name of \$1000.00 to The Rotary Foundation.

Guest Speaker: Randy Kamp, MLA

Topic: 2012 Budget or Economic Action Plan of 2012

Winner of four elections in a row, Randy explained this is not just a one term document. This budget takes a long term look and it is on track to be a balance budget by 2015. Key element to growth and control of spending. Two key points of this budget is (1) not raising taxes and (2) not cutting transfers to the provinces or to our seniors.

Highlights of the budget include:

- Increase ability to invest in research
- Responsible economic development and trade expansion (focus of our government)
- Old age security change to age 67. In BC age expectancy is 79 in men and 83 in women. We are living longer in BC than any other province. It is the government's biggest single expenditure spending 110 billion yearly.
- And finally the elimination of the penny by June 2012
