'Music in the ManCave' raises \$25,000 for Rotary's PolioPlus!

Lee Harman's hangar at the Arlington Municipal Airport once again played host to "Music in the ManCave" on March 2, as Harman and his

fellow Arlington Rotarian Ron Love served as the emcees for an evening of fundraising for the Rotary Foundation's PolioPlus Program, with roughly 100 attendees, and musical accompaniment provided by Mike Zachman and the Jennifer Scott Trio.

Love estimated that this third "Music in the ManCave" event raised more than \$25,000, although he acknowledged that the number of matching grants at work makes it difficult for him to nail down a number just yet.

"Rotary District 5050 stretches from Everett all the way up into Canada, and we had Rotary Clubs from Seattle to Canada represented," Love said. "In Canada and the United States, all those dollars donated are being matched by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and in Canada alone, the Canadian government is also matching every dollar, so we're getting \$2 for every dollar donated from the U.S. and \$3 from every dollar donated from Canada. Not only have we not finished counting the pledges that we got that night, but we've still got pledges coming in."

Guest Speakers:





Our program was presented by **Sarah Hamid-Balma** and **Jamillia Wong**. Sarah is the Director, Mental Help Promotion, of the Canadian Mental Helped Association (CMHA), BC Division. Jamillia is the Fundraising and Program

Development Coordinator for the CMHA, Simon Fraser Branch.

The CMHA is approximately 100 years old and has a national office, with 19 Branches in BC alone where it serves 82,000 people. Its focus is on

- 1) education of the public about mental health issues,
- 2) influencing and establishing public policy, and
- providing support services through the branch offices for those with mental disabilities (such as housing, employment, etc.).

Our speakers advised that 70% of mental health issues first appear in adolescence. 12% of youth consider suicide at some point, 5% have attempted suicide, 17% have inflicted some form of self-harm, and 14% say that the stress in their life is more than they can take. 18% of teenage girls, and 7% of teenage boys, do not access help when they need it. The good news is, however, that most youth say they have an adult person they could turn to for help, and 90% of them advised they would talk to a friend about mental health issues. Most mental illnesses are treatable when caught early.

A new program in 2007 called Blue Wave was established by the family of a teenager who committed suicide. This program focussed on youth talks in schools. Their website is www.ok2bblue.org. In 2012, the family who started this program pass the torch to CMHA to continue it. Plans which CMHA has for British Columbia include establishing a bursary for a student with mental illness, setting up a Youth Advisory Council, and operating a mental illness well-being and skills course led by youth themselves.

Recently a Youth Summit was held in New Westminster as a pilot program, entitled "iStand Youth Summit". Approximately 86 youths between the ages of 13 and 18 registered, supported by 14 professionals

who conducted three separate workshops on various topics relating to stress and mental health. They plan to stay connected with these youths by having recreation-based outings every couple of months. They will serve over 200 clients in the New Westminster, Tri-Cities and Maple Ridge areas.
