

- Since 2012, **Ajay Caleb** has been the **Vocational Service Chair for District 5050**. He has been involved in Rotary District 5050 for a number of years, holding positions as Club President and Annual Hike Chair in addition to his current position, and recently served as photographer at RYLA 5040 and 5050. He currently lives in Surrey where he and his wife have lived for 24 years, is

currently the Membership Chair at the Rotary Club in Cloverdale, and is a self-employed Business Analyst.




- Gail Finnson who works with the Ridge Meadows Association for Community Living (RMACL) is the Community Employment Supervisor for that organization. She has been very active in our community since moving here in 1982, and has been assisting people with their job search for over 15 years. Three years ago Gail began

working with RMACL in order to focus on assisting people with disabilities to find jobs in their community. Gail has been instrumental in getting the "Rotary At Work" initiative off the ground in BC.



- Liane Lowden is an Employment Specialist with PosAbilities Employment Service, where she has worked for the past 15 years "empowering people with diverse abilities".



# ROTARY AT WORK *It's Good Business!*

**Rotary at Work** is an initiative for Rotarians and others to hire persons with diverse disabilities. Ajay said the proper way to look at it is that everybody has a diverse abilities — everyone is able to be employed and to do meaningful work.

Ajay presented a short but interesting video showing how Walgreens in the United States at one of their distribution plants has 40% of its employees as persons with some sort of disability. Hiring persons with disabilities is not about making the employer feel good. It is not about doing it for altruistic reasons. Rather, employers need to understand that it is "good for business". Disabled employees have low absenteeism, higher staff morale, lower turnover (which can be very expensive) and fewer on-the-job accidents. Some revealing statistics include the following about employees with diverse abilities:

- They are 82% above average in work performance
- They are 86% above average in attendance
- They are 97% above average in safety performance

Gail also talked to us about the benefits of hiring people with disabilities. Firstly, through the RMACL businesses can receive job coaching and support for new employees. Prospective employees are selected by the Association so the business does not have to seek out the employees themselves. She pointed out that hiring people with disabilities increases productivity and morale within the workplace, and builds a more diverse, inclusive and accommodating workplace.
