Announcements

Our Club Christmas Party, which will be a catered event, will be held on Friday, December 5, 2014, when Adrienne and Warren Dale will welcome us all into their lovely home to enjoy their great hospitality and a fun evening.

The Haney Club Christmas party, to which our club and family, children and friends are invited, will be held on Wednesday, December 10, at the Club's regular meeting place at Meadow Gardens Golf Club.

The election (or will it be an acclamation?) of our own club's officers and directors will be held at our next club meeting on Tuesday, December 2, 2014.

Business Meeting

As it was a business meeting, various committee chairpersons and members updated us on the Club's activities. Full committee reports have been posted on our website and/or emailed to the members directly. The following is therefore only a sample of some of the "goings on" in our Club.

Secretary David Riddell's report was the shortest and sweetest - "All is ok on the western front!"

Treasurer Walter Volpatti reported that all money that had been donated for our Repulse Bay project has now been used up, with the result that the monthly funds sent to Nunavut to support the literary project are no longer available. Although the club has \$50,000 in assets, one half of that money will need to be satisfied to secure the Line of Credit needed to satisfy the licensing requirements for next year's Duck Race. The \$5000 that we need to purchase our new flock of baby ducks will be funded from the balance of the Sports Banquet funds which are available. The club decided that this was appropriate in view of the fact that all of the monies from this great event go back to support mainly sports activities in our communities.

Club Service chairman Betty Johansen, in addition to reminding us of the Christmas party being held on December 5, urged club members to bring forth recommendations as to future guest speakers to our weekly meetings.

Communities Services chairman Angie Edmonds advised that this Rotary Year we have had 12 applications for funding and have paid out \$4,000 so far. That leaves approximately \$4,300 to spend until our next gaming grant in Jan/Feb 2015, after taking into account the \$18,700 for committed funds (i.e. vocational bursaries, 4-Way Test, fire fighters bursaries & 7% operating costs as advised by Walter). Depending on how we do with Oktoberfest this coming year, we may have additional funds for other projects that don't qualify for gaming funds. Angie would like to see some "hands on" projects in the community to raise awareness about what we do and increase our visibility as a club as well.

International Committee chairman Ineke Boekhorst advised that our Nicaragua project (which was to go forward in early January 2015) has been delayed for a month or two because a Rotary grant failed to get approved on a technicality. That however will be fixed, and the trip to Nicaragua will the delayed until late February or the beginning of March 2015, which may give some members who could not attend in January the opportunity to consider doing so.

Fundraising for the project will include the sale of cyclamens at our local hospital on Tuesday Dec. 9 between 1:30 and 5 pm and on Wednesday Dec. 17 between 9 am and 5 pm. Any members who can help out Ineke and Peter on those days would be most welcomed.



The annual **Santa Claus Parade** will be held Saturday, Dec. 6, 2014 where donations will be collected for Friends in Need Food Bank. Those able to attend are to meet at 5:30 pm on Brown Avenue near the School District offices, with the parade starting at 6:00 pm and over by 7:00. (More info www.mapleridgechristmasfestival.com)

Food and donations to the Food Bank will also take place when the annual **CP Holiday Train** comes through town between 7:30 and 8:30 pm on the evening of Wednesday, Dec. 17.

Poppa Duck Bob Shantz (who fortunately for us all has not given up the title yet) advised of the successful organizational meeting of the 2015 Duck Race, which will be held on the third Sunday in July of 2015.

The Haney Club has agreed to take responsibility for ticket control which Bob and his staff have looked after for the past four years. The Haney Club has also committed \$5,000 towards the purchase of the new ducks.

Ineke Boekhorst has volunteered herself and Peter to look after venues for the ticket sales (a dedicated, time-consuming, labour intensive job, last year looked after by Matt DeBruyn and his wife Lynda) - on the condition that Ineke and Peter will be relieved of looking after the events taking place at the site on Race Day (which was, in itself, a huge undertaking).

Ineke (with the full support of Bob and others) believe that the events at the park on the day of the race be "contracted out" to a professional person or organization. This could bring the day of the Race to a new level - an annual Community Event - with other activities going on that would be fun and interesting to the community, with the duck race as the highlight of the day, but with other events happening to attract a larger community participation.

Chris Duyvestyn of the Haney club has graciously agreed (or, is that "has been graciously voluntold"?) to store the ducks on his property when they are not frantically paddling to the finish line.


