Rotary Moment

Dave Rempel told us of [not of his own "Rempel Moment", but of] a Rotary moment of polio survivor John Nanni, a member of a Rotary Club in New Jersey, who as a youngster was paralysed by polio from his neck down for six months. His "aha" and "wow" Rotary Moment was that, and as a Rotarian, he had the honour of being a part of the Rotary PolioPlus delegation to the UN General Assembly special session to "Unite Against Polio". He was introduced to Peter Salk, the son of Jonas Salk who discovered the original polio vaccine. He also met, among others, Bill Gates of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Canadian Rotarian Ramesh Ferris, a polio survivor, who handcycled across Canada for polio eradication [and who, by the way, Peter & Ineke Boekhorst once heard speak at a Rotary convention]. Mr. Nanni was amazed to see the presidents of Pakistan and Afghanistan sit next to each other for the entire event, as a sign of unity against polio. For him, it was one of the defining moments in the past decades to see world leaders unite through UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon's dedication to make polio eradication one of his major efforts during his term.

The Mission Youth House (MY House) is hoping to fill this void and provide a safety net for youth."]

Who's Who

Our speaker was one "fantastic" ladynamely Ineke Boekhorst - who is, without a doubt, the busiest person in Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows, but who nevertheless always has a moment or two to spare for a good cause. These are some of the things we learned about her:

Ineke was born in the small town of Hilversum, just outside of Amsterdam, in her "homeland" of Holland. She



popped out as number 5 in a family of 7 children. The year was 1950. Her father owned seven international bookstores throughout Holland - with the thought that he would someday give one to each of his 7 children – but..... [as Robbie Burns wrote in his best Scottish accent]: "the best laid schemes o' mice an' men / gang aft agley"].

In 1971 she tied the knot with Peter [after which Peter had his own memorable "Aha" and "Wow" Moment].

Later in 1979, they sold everything and moved with four children (ages 2 to 7) to Canada. Landing in Montréal, they bought a motorhome and drove across Canada, where they enjoyed and marvelled at the many beautiful sights



across our wide land. On the prairies the kids thought the grain elevators looked like milk cartons, and called them "milk carton houses".

Two of Ineke's sisters had already immigrated to Canada and were living in Maple Ridge, so they travelled here with the family and all six of them lived in their motorhome for three months until they were able to purchase a small home on 121st Avenue. They then moved onto 3 acres in Webster's Corner where they raised chickens, ducks, a pony, goats, sheep, and even a cow. In 1988 they moved to Pitt Meadows, and still live in that same house today.

1994 was a tragic year. Ineke and Peter's second son was killed in a motor vehicle accident on September 4 - which also happens to be the birthday of their daughter Marjolein.

Volunteering has always been a major part of Ineke's life. When her kids were young, she volunteered in Scouting, 4-H Clubs, St. Patrick's School, and the Maple Ridge Figure Skating Club and Haney Neptune Swim Club (both of which her children were members), just to mention a few.

Being an entrepreneur at heart, when her youngest child started school, she went into business, and in 1985 purchase the "Brass Nut" (selling a variety of small items) which was located across from what is now London Drugs in the Valley Fair Mall. Then, with John Menning and Norma Mitchell, they started a company called BMM and managed the BingoPlex at the corner of 224th and 119th Avenue. Next, in 1990, was "The Winning Edge", an embroidery business which, among other things, did corporate logos, etc. And last but not least, she went into business with former Rotarian Debbie Pearce and they became chocolatiers, purchasing "Chocolates by Grace" on 224 Street, which became a major supplier of chocolate corporate logos for such businesses as HSBC and Johnston Meier Insurance. [Peter no doubt helped out as the volunteer chocolate taster and receptacle for "seconds" that did not make it to the chocolate box]. They ran that successful business for nine years, and then sold it. In 2007, Ineke became the Executive Director of the Downtown Maple Ridge Business Improvement Association - a full-time job which she loves and still holds today.

Ineke has been an active Rotarian for the past 25 years ["active" is an understatement, but there is no word in the English language that will suffice]. She was introduced to Rotary by Past President Kenneth Patterson in 1991. She has held all positions in our Rotary Club, including being our President in 2001 – 2002. She has served on every committee and fundraiser event, including the Sports Banquet since 1998, the Four-Way Test Program in our elementary schools [Ineke heard about this program while attending a RI Convention and brought it back to our club for implementation], the Shelter Box Program, our Exchange Student program, the Rotary Duck Race Committee, [and everything else you can think of].

She has attended 10 Rotary International Conventions throughout the world. She, along with Peter, went to Nicaragua in 2014 and had a "fantastic" two-week experience building kitchens onto 2 schools in a small village in that country.

Her daughter **Marjolein** is a member of the Westbank Club, a Past President, District 5060 Membership Chair, RLI Trainer, PETS Trainer, and currently is Assistant District Governor.

In 2010, Ineke was chosen as Maple Ridge Citizen of the Year (shared with Mike Murray).
