Program - Jim Coulter's Who's Who



Jim was born on March 4, 1951. He hardly got to know his hometown when his father moved to Agassiz in October 1952 and obtained a job as a milk delivery man. Starting in 1953 he worked for one company from which he retired in 1978. Tragically, at the age of 59, he died in a car accident in 1980.

Jim went the same elementary and high school through all of his school years and graduated in 1969. He was very

active in school sports, particularly baseball at which he excelled. In fact, after high school he remained active in baseball for 40 years.

As a young lad one of the first jobs that he got was at the Harrison Hotel where he served such famous guests as Bob Hope and Pierre Trudeau. In 1971 he moved to Kamloops to find other work, but then he and a friend decided to leave their jobs and take a four-month road trip across Canada - a memorable event which he does not regret doing.

In 1973, while working, he fell 45 feet to the ground from a telephone pole and was seriously injured. The fact that he was only 23 years of age probably saved his life, but even then it took him nine months to recover.

In 1977 he married, and a year later his first child was born. He got into the car sales business and became the manager of a used car dealership. Thereafter he got interested in the newspaper business and was offered a job in 1987 for the Kamloops Sentinel Newspaper. This seemed like a good career move to a secure job as that newspaper was one of the oldest publications in the province. Unfortunately, five months after he started the newspaper shut down (through no fault of his own). Thereafter he got other jobs in the newspaper business. To supplement his income he started his own successful side business, namely that of a mobile disc jockey where he provided music for various dances and other occasions. In 1993 he moved to Victoria and became the manager of a newspaper in Sydney. In November 2000 he became the managing editor of the Maple Bridge News, a job which he still holds today.

Jim has been very community minded throughout his life and has coached soccer for 25 or 30 years, as well as coaching hockey. He was also a scout leader for a period of time when his children were young. He has enjoyed racquetball, skiing, and even motorcycling. He is a past president of our local Chamber of Commerce, a director of the Ridge Meadows Hospital Foundation, and of course has been a Rotary member for many years. He also admits to being a terrible golfer.

Jim has five children of which he is very proud (one daughter and for sons). Coming soon to a hospital near you will be Jim's first grandchild.
