## Guest Speaker - Truth and Reconciliation Commission



Maple Ridge Mayor **Nicole Read** gave one of our best programs so far this year, with a moving and insightful talk about her research in connection with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) and how the Indian Residential School (IRS) system wreaked havoc upon our First Nations peoples.

Nicole is well-qualified to talk on the subject. For 15 years she has researched the history of the Indian Residential Schools, including research on claims for over 50 BC First Nations, including the Katzie First Nation. She is the former Project Manager and Records Lead for the TRC, and was named the most

inspirational graduate student of the Simon Fraser University history department!

At the beginning of her talk, Nicole made a poignant observation. The IRS system did not in any way pass the Four-Way Test. As we heard her talk, it became even more obvious to us all that the IRS system failed miserably - it was not truthful, it was not fair to all concerned, and did not in any way build goodwill and better friendships, and was not beneficial to all concerned. As Nicole said, it is sorry chapter in the history of our country.

Early versions of church-run residential school started in the 1830s.

In 1867 the British North America Act entrenched in the Constitution parliamentary authority over "Indians". The first *Indian Act* was passed by Parliament in 1876.

In 1879 the "Davin Report" encouraged the use of education for assimilation, and in the 1880s the federal government adopted the early form of the IRS model.

Some of the examples of how the children were treated included the following:

- Wendy LaFond was told she was going to a residential school to keep her sister company, "but the first thing they did when we got there was to separate us".
- Fred Sasakamoose said, "I was an employee a slave.
   We used to milk about 60 cows in the evening..."
- And of course, there was physical and sexual abuse.
   There have been 37,951 independent assessment claims, resulting in compensation of \$2,690,000,000.

In the early years of the system, the odds of a residential school student dying, was 1 in 2. Throughout the history of the schools the odds of dying for children in Indian Residential Schools was 1 in 25. The odds of dying for Canadians serving in World War II, was 1 in 26.

There were 139 residential schools across Canada, with more than 150,000 students. The last one closed in the 1990s. Today there are 80,000 living survivors. Research has shown that at least 6,000 students died while attending the schools.

Nicole recommended that we watch the National Film Board film entitled *We Were Children*, and that we visit the TRC's website at www.trc.ca

As young children, Lyna and Glen were taken from their homes and placed in church-run boarding schools, where they suffered years of physical, sexual and emotional abuse, the effects of which persist in their adult lives.

**'We Were Children'** gives voice to a national tragedy and demonstrates the incredible resilience of the human spirit.
