Guest Speaker: our own Dr. Patrick O'Brien, DVM

<u>Topic: Veterinary Medicine and his experiences as a student, and as a dairy cow vet in the Comox Valley</u>



The following is the bare bones of Patrick's talk (in person, it was even greater!) who said:

The first veterinary college was opened in 1860 in Lyons, France in 1860; I think in response to a disease outbreak in farm animals. In 1862, the first college opened in North America in Toronto, but moved to Guelph in

1922. The University of Montreal, from whence my wife Stefanie graduated, opened in 1886 (the same year that Vancouver was incorporated), later moving to Saint-Hyacinthe, Quebec, in 1947. The Western College of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Saskatchewan opened in 1965, from which I graduated in 1987. The Atlantic college opened in 1986 and the U of Calgary opened in 2008. The degree is Doctor of Veterinary Medicine or DVM. The French school mixes up the letters to make DMV.

Students must have a minimum of 2 years of sciences prior to application (except Quebec) though most have a degree. A few have master's degrees and there is the odd doctorate. The program is 4 years with 8 weeks of extra class time per year over regular university programs. The program is focused on cows, horses, cats and dogs. Less attention is paid to pigs and poultry, and even less to exotics. So many animals, so little time! There are courses and CE available in all fields in conferences around North America every year. Upon graduation, most vets go into private practice immediately, but internships are available as well. New grads make about \$70,000 per year. Seasoned vets make about \$110,000. Practice owners generally do a bit better, but no one should expect to get wealthy from vet practice. From there, graduates can specialize in surgery, medicine, radiology, ophthalmology (medical and surgical eye problems), epidemiology, oncology, reproduction etc.

Vets like me limited our practice to dairy, equine, poultry etc. I was very much interested in preventing diseases rather than treating them. (It was great training for my current position which is also about production and risk management.) Each province has a lab where diagnostics are performed to help field vets identify disease problems on private farms. Vets also work for the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA), pharmaceutical firms, vet colleges, research or other work. Besides me, one class mate is a mortgage broker and another was a school teacher. It is a tough job to be a 24/7 on-call vet and run a family and have a life. Ultimately, the risk of losing my family after giving up my great farm and practice in the Comox Valley led me to changing species from cows to investments and financial planning.

Veterinarians are provincially regulated, but have a national voice via the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association or CVMA. The college of BC veterinarians is the regulatory body setting bylaws and investigating complaints. The Society of Veterinarians of BC is the self interest group.
