Guest Speaker - Jim Michals



Our own club member Jim Michals presented our program. Jim, who has been a member of our club for approximately 1 ½ years, is moving to Vancouver Island in the very near future and will therefore no longer be with us. Jim has been a certified arbitrator for at least 25 years, and is in the process of writing a book entitled "Peace Making Deconstructed".

He started out reciting a passage from the Song of Hiawatha (an 1855 epic poem by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow).

He said he found Rotary's four-way test, which has been translated into 100 languages, a good approach to arbitration.

He believes that there are three "sacred cows" of conflict resolution which are Myths:

- Myth #1: there is one best way to resolve a dispute
- Myth #2: reason and technology will resolve conflicts in the future
- Myth #3: conflicts can be resolved without a shared value system and code of conduct

Jim feels that the answer to proper conflict resolution lies in for things:

- 1. Have respect for those involved, and follow the "creator" (in whatever form you believe in)
- 2. Get the "log" out of your own eye first
- 3. Gently restore, and
- 4. Then, go and be reconciled

With respect to #3., the key is corrective and progressive discipline. Correction means putting things back the way they were, but punishment should be way down on the list towards peacemaking.
