Guest Speaker - Official Visit of District Gov. Scott Dudley



DG Scott Dudley was introduced by ADG **Preet Pall**:

Scott Dudley and his wife, Christine or "Saint Christine" which she is called and deservedly so, live on Whidbey Island in the City of Oak Harbor, Washington.

Scott joined the Rotary Club of North Whidbey Island Sunrise back in January of 2001 but became a "Rotarian" on a wheelchair

distribution trip to Mexico several years later. He has since done great work in both Haiti as well as Honduras.

Recently, he was a recipient of Rotary International's "Service Above Self" Award. He is a Major Donor as well as a member of the Paul Harris Society and a member of Rotary Foundation's Bequest Society.

When he is not working on his Rotary Club's next project or volunteering at the Rotary District Level, Scott can be found managing his investment office in Oak Harbor, Washington.

Scott stays active and has recently completed his 21st marathon.

He also served as the Mayor of the City of Oak Harbor, from 2012 through 2015.

Scott and Christine love to travel and have a total of five children.

Those that know Scott know that he is a huge Seattle Seahawks fan but even a bigger fan of Rotary!





DG Scott Dudley then spoke to us. He said that although he joined Rotary in 2001, he did not feel like a true "Rotarian" until he went with a group from his Oak Harbour Rotary Club to Mexico to help deliver 280 wheelchairs to those who cannot afford them. He said that meeting the recipients and hearing their stories of how the wheelchairs affected their lives and was a life-changing

experience for them, also changed him as a person. For example, he met the mother of a disabled child who was five years old, and in order to get him to school each day she had to carry him on her back. She stated that without the wheelchair, he would no longer have been able to go to school when he got a bit older because he would be too heavy for her to carry him. The wheelchair therefore did more than give him transportation – it enabled him to get an education.

Said Scott, "We take so much for granted. For example, we turn on the tap and get clean drinking water. We have food and health care. By living here in Canada and United States, we have already won the lottery."

When the earthquake hit Haiti in 2010, DG Scott was going to go there to help put up shelter boxes, but he was not able to go because of civic unrest in the region. When this trip to Haiti was cancelled, he decided to visit Rotary clubs in Canada. One of the 13 clubs he visited was the Haney Rotary club where he learned from **Keesha Rosario** (who is a past president of that Club) that her husband **Philip Rosario** had polycystic kidney disease and that he was going to die without an immediate kidney transplant. Scott was familiar with polycystic kidney disease as it had afflicted his mother and members of his extended family. Although Scott had never met the Rosario's, he immediately volunteered to give one of his kidneys to Philip Rosario. Within four days after that first meeting, the transplant had taken place at the Vancouver General Hospital. He was asked, "Why not donate to an American or somebody that you knew?"

Scott's answer was "let me tell you about Rotary".

While about 123,000 people are waiting for organ transplants, nearly 102,000 of them need kidneys. 7,000 Persons will die this year because they cannot obtain an organ transplant.

"Whether it is giving a wheelchair to someone in Mexico or a kidney to someone in Canada, it is seeing the effect which this has on the recipient and family members, that makes it an amazing experience", Scott said.

As Rotarians, when we do good in the world we create ripple affects. This is a great year to be a Rotarian. It is expected that polio will be eradicated from the world by the end of this year or early 2017.

This year The Rotary Foundation is celebrating its 100th year since its inception, and we should celebrate that event. District 5040 and 5050 will host a Million Dollar Dinner to celebrate 100 Years of The Rotary Foundation "Doing Good in the World". Rotary International President John Germ will be the keynote speaker. The event will be held on Monday, January 9, 2017 in Tsawwassen where we can all meet him and hear him talk. Also plan to attend the District Conference. "Don't keep Rotary a secret" The following is the news clip that was heard on the radio about the kidney transplant at the time:

PITT MEADOWS (NEWS1130)

The wait for a normal life is over for one Pitt Meadows man. Phil Rosario has Polycystic Kidney Disease and today, he'll get a new kidney all thanks to one man from Washington State. Rosario is expected to have his life-altering surgery at 1 p.m. at Vancouver General Hospital. It's a procedure that should take up most of his day. How he got the kidney in the first place is "an incredible story of humanity" according to Phil's wife, Keesha Rosario. At a Rotary Club meeting in Metro Vancouver, Scott Dudley, the Mayor of Oak Harbor, WA, was in attendance and that's when he agreed to give up his own kidney. "It's like divine spirits, it's pretty unbelievable. He went forward right after that and got tested. I had no idea," explains Phil. Keesha is still in disbelief. She couldn't imagine a family member donating an organ, let alone a stranger or an acquaintance that they didn't even know coming forward. Phil refers to Dudley as a "perfect stranger" who was impacted by the disease and that's why he is compelled to help out. "He's had family members that have passed away because of it, so he's well aware of kidney disease. He himself doesn't have it, it skipped his generation." Both Phil and Keesha hope their story encourages others to "pay it forward" and raises the awareness of organ donation.
