What is Christmas Haven?

Every Christmas Eve since 1998, a group of community minded volunteers organize a free, non-denominational, and wheelchair accessible Christmas Dinner, promoting a sense of belonging and camaraderie on a night that often brings hardship to those with little or no support. Christmas Haven is held at The ACT in downtown Maple Ridge from 6 pm to 9 pm every December 24th. This free event provides a wonderfully festive atmosphere for our guests and is the centre point for a dinner of turkey and all the fixings; local entertainment; children's activities; and a visit from Santa. No reservations are required.

What is YAIL?

YAIL gives participants insight into some of the basics of what it means, and takes, to be a leader: to help participants become well-rounded individuals with increased perspective and enthusiasm for growth, and who are able to make informed decisions. Program: Mina Lilleheier - Exchange Student from Norway



Mina was introduced by **Sarah Nelson**, a member of the Haney Rotary Club and Mina's host mother, who said what a great young woman Mina is, and how gratifying it was for Sarah to have her in her home.

Mina started off by telling us a bit about her country of Norway, which has approximately 5,000,000 people. She said Norway has been deemed by the UN as

the "Happiest Country in the World". (Canada is #7). Like Canada, their governments did not treat their aboriginals in the early days, but their aboriginals now are better treated and have their own government. She showed us various pictures of her country, and included a picture of a historic Stave Church. Stave churches are considered to be among the most important examples of wooden Medieval architecture in Europe. In the Middle Ages, there were probably more than 1,000 stave churches in Norway. Today, only 28 remain, including Urnes stave church, which is included on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

May 17 is the day they celebrate the founding of their country in 1814 (when Norway became an independent country), much like Canada Day. Each region of the country has its own costumes and men and women and children of all ages dress up in their "Bunad", or national costume. The buildings are decorated with Norwegian flags. This day of celebration is also called "Children's Day" because children are given lots of treats and freedom to have fun and celebrate. Every nation has a national day but probably very few of them are so enthusiastically and uniquely celebrated like May 17th in Norway. The local children carry flags and march together with bands. Ice cream, hot dogs and other goods to eat are abundant. Graduating high school students wear uniforms and celebrate the approaching school year's end.

Mina comes from a town called "As" which has a population of approximately 25,000 people, and which is about 30 minutes from the capital city of Oslo, Norway.

Mina was born in the year 2000 and has a sister age 14 and a brother age 11. She is very active in skiing, running, biking, and

playing the piano. Norwegians, at least the brave [or crazy] ones, have "polar bear swims", where the participants wear Santa hats and stockings.

Mina compiled a "to do list" of things that she wanted to do when she came to Canada as an exchange student, and although she's only been here a couple of months, she is already completed it.

Dave Rempel asked her what she found different about Canada compared to her native Norway. She surprised everybody by saying that the students in the schools here pay much *more* attention to the teachers and have a lot of work to do. In Norway she has only one class to go to every day, whereas here she goes to eight different classes with eight different teachers. Also, she enjoys the fact that sports here are connected to the schools and she gets to socialize with other students through school sports. In Norway, on the other hand, sports are separate from school activities.

She thanked the Rotarians for giving her this great opportunity.
