Program: **Leslie Norman**, Pitt Meadows Museum



Leslie Norman is the curator of the Pitt Meadows Museum, a position which she has held for over 20 years. The Museum is operated by the PM Heritage and Museum Society, which came together in 1978 and incorporated in 1980. Their main role is to be the charitable governing authority of the PM Museum and Archives. Their first task was to set up a Museum in the community, and they accomplished this with a space

in the old municipal hall and soon after moved to a small site in an old house on Harris Road. In 1995 the Society moved into a slightly larger house on Davison Road, having their grant opening on Canada Day of that year. In 1995 they also received their first fee for service under the newly formed joint parks department, and they hired a very part time Curator.

Just three years later in 1998, the Society was on the move again, this time to a permanent home in the Old General Store building at 12294 Harris Road.



The municipality had purchased the heritage building in 1997 and did a restoration over eight months allowing the Museum to open to the public on Pitt Meadows Day in June 1998. The Society has been here ever since and have added to the facility the Hoffmann and Son Machine site in 1999.

The Hoffmann and Son site is a 1930's machine shop. It includes a working forge and a collection of restored stationary engines. The site was donated to the Museum in 1999 by the Hoffmann family, and opened to the public in 2001.



Today, the Museum has a ¾ time curator (Leslie) and three very part time museum assistants. It also takes on up to three full-time summer students each year. Outside of that, it relies on volunteers and contractors working on honorariums to help run its programs and keep the Society functioning.

Leslie spoke to us about the Memories Mapping Project.

This is the Museum's latest project (developed with "BC|Canada 150" grants), which is a revamped website that features a new interactive Community History Map that allows the public to be the recorders of the long past and more recent history of the Pitt Meadows area. You can go on the Museums Website, and click on the map to add your history or explore what others have left.


The museum is open:
