Guest speaker - our (Liberal) Member of Parliament Dan Ruimy



Dan said that in keeping with the unwritten rule that his talk shouldn’t get political when speaking to groups such as Rotary, he talked about the trip that he took last November along with his assistant Khalida Ali to see what one of Dan’s constituents was doing to help others. They went with **George Klassen** to Malawi, Africa, where George Klassen goes many times to install water wells to poor villages in

that country. George has been responsible for installing approximately 45 wells (of which 43 are still in operation) bringing fresh water to villages. Dan was thrilled to see how enthusiastic and happy villagers were to receive fresh water, which saved them having to walk long distances to streams to get water, in which they also bathed and wash their clothes. He said that people in those villages were extremely poor, but nevertheless happy (partly because they didn’t know what they did not have). Dan also visited some orphanages where about 30 children between the ages of two and 10 years resided in very poor conditions.

Dan said that he came back home with a renewed sense of what he could do for communities in Canada. He pointed out that even in Canada there was, as of a couple of years ago, at least 150 Indigenous reserves or communities that did not have access to clean drinking water (without boiling it first), because governments of the past have ignored these problems. He stated that going to Africa reaffirmed why he got into politics, namely, to try to get in to place policies that helped people.

Presidents closing quip:

[A recent article in the local News said this about George Klassen:

It was seven years ago that Maple Ridge's George Klassen first travelled to Africa and learned of the plight of the children of Malawi.

Stricken by drought and devastated by disease, the tiny land-locked country in central Sub-Saharan Africa is home to more than one million orphans, despite having a population of 14 million. More than 10 per cent of the country's population has AIDS and the average life expectancy is 38 years, leaving many children without a parent to raise them.

Klassen, who had long performed missionary work with the Amazon Evangelism Society in South America, had been invited to take part in missionary work in Nigeria.

There Klassen heard about the dire circumstances in neighbouring Malawi and travelled there to see the conditions first-hand. He was introduced to a group of more than 100 orphans in the town of Ntcheu who had banded together for survival.

"They had three years of drought and had to walk three miles every day just to get water," says Klassen. "They had nothing."

The responsibility of fetching water fell literally on the backs of the girls. Even if school was an option, they would not be able to take advantage of the opportunity.

Klassen realized that if the children had access to clean water, not only would there be less of a risk of contracting malaria or other water-born illnesses, it would open up opportunities for the children to attend school.

Two months later [after returning home], Klassen was back in Malawi, drilling wells, and Project Wellness was born.

In total, Klassen and his group have dug 20 wells, providing potable water for close to 20,000 people, and have built an orphanage and a school for the children in the area....."
