Program:

Orville and Ruth Lee - the **Pathfinder Youth Centre Society** - "Today's the day they change their path - mentoring one youth at a time"



Pathfinder Youth Centre Society is a non-profit organization that provides mentor ship and employment skill programs to youth aged 15 to 30. They aim to prepare their youth for both the workforce and real life situations as they move forward in life.



Orville and Ruth, who are husband-and-wife, became aware that youth who are in foster care are looked after until they become adults at the age of 19, at which time they are out on the street on their own without any help, assistance or guidance. The Lees, who are foster parents to four children themselves, wanted to do something about this gap in the system. 16 years ago they started the program to work with youth.

As it says on their website, through the Employment Ready Program, at-risk youth develop life and employment skills, gain useful industry certifications, and complete a work experience; not an industry-specific program. Youth may be experiencing employment barriers such as lack of job retention; being a single parent, an aboriginal youth, a visible minority, and/or a person with disabilities; and/or recovering from addiction. Youth must be legally entitled to work in Canada, not be attending school, and not be a recipient of employment insurance. At Pathfinder, our clients have already faced more challenges than most – difficult home situations, abuse, addiction, incarceration or mental and physical health issues, to name a few – but they aren't defined by their challenges. The young people who walk into our Centres are motivated by an inner resolve to find a way to complete their schooling, find a job and make a fresh start on their lives.



They have an office in Maple Ridge at 1-20110 Stewart Crescent, Maple Ridge, BC V2X 0T4, and an office in Surrey.

They try not to duplicate services. For example, if a youth has an addiction problem, they refer them to Alouette Addictions. They have observed that youth are now displaying symptoms of anxiety at an earlier age, and the number of young people with anxiety is on the rise.

One of their ways of raising money is that they have (or wish to get) 1,000 families to donate two dollars per month; they also sell "Coffee for Cause". These proceeds support their mentorship costs, including meals etc.

Say Orville and Ruth, "we like to think we are a prevention program".
