### RI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



My Rotary journey began 40 years ago when I joined the Rotary Club of Decatur, Alabama, at the age of 25, and it has brought my family and me many unforgettable moments. But nothing could have prepared me for connecting with the world as president of Rotary International. My individual Rotary journey has become a shared Rotary journey with each of you.

All of the incredible people Gay and I met this year — Rotarians, Rotaractors, and the extended family of Rotary — will be an inspiration for the rest of our lives. We visited clubs and projects from Uruguay to Ukraine, from Nigeria to New Zealand, and beyond. We were privileged to crisscross the globe, circumnavigating it twice and moving back and forth between the Northern and Southern hemispheres. Each country and each stop held its own Rotary magic. While in Zimbabwe in March, we participated in a medical vocational training team mission with Rotarians from India, providing health, hope, and life itself to the thousands who came for treatment. We also felt the energy of more than 300 young people at a Rotary Youth Symposium in Harare. What a thrill it was to be with these young people!



# **OUR CLUB LAST WEEK'S ZOOM MEETING:**

President Adrienne Dale presided.

**Mark Stewart**, Executive Director of the Salvation Army, Maple Ridge ministries.

Program: Doug Sabourin - Alouette Addictions Services



Doug is the interim Executive Director of Alouette Addictions, and has held that position since September 2019. He has been in the human services field for 50 years, and is temporarily taking the place of the executive director who is away on leave.

Services Offered by Alouette Addictions include the following (as per its website):

- Consultation with Mental Health Therapists.
- Counselling for any person or family member affected by alcohol and/or drug misuse.
- Opioid Replacement Therapy Clinic with two doctors accepting patients for methadone and/or suboxone.
- Education programs and group experiences geared toward the needs of our client population.
- Daily group meetings with a variety of topics related to addiction recovery and it's challenges.
- Specialized group dedicated towards people that are affected by others' addictions.
- Assessment and referral to other resources as appropriate i.e. detox centres and residential treatment programs.
- Outreach and education to groups who may be at risk of developing a substance misuse problem.
- Outreach Team geared towards providing community support and resources.
- Funding support for individuals who are at risk of losing their housing and/or are currently without housing.
- In-office laundry facilities for individuals who have no access to a washer or dryer.
- Fun In Recovery for individuals in Sober Living learning to enjoy life without substances.
- Information and training for professionals in the community on a variety of substance misuse topics.
- Prevention programming and promotion of the healthy community concept.

One of the programs discussed by Doug is the Alouette Addictions' Youth Outreach Program.

This preventative program offers specialized counselling support for children affected by their parents' or other family members' drug use. The program is designed to help children understand the effects of drug use to make healthy decisions based on knowledge. Outreach workers also work in the community, connecting with children who may already have a drug-use problem of their own. The program enables counsellors to develop relationships with the children and their families and connect them with treatment. Doug said that when children are given important knowledge about the effects of drug use (which includes alcohol) at an early age, they are less likely to make disastrous personal drug and alcohol decisions later in life. The emphasis is for adults is harm reduction, and for school-age children, is largely abstinence. He is of the view that alcohol abuse is the biggest drug problem.

When asked what he considers the biggest problem or impediment in dealing with addictions, he said it is the lack of funding by the government for preventive programs for children in schools for alcohol and other drugs. He also pointed out that too many children are given prescription medication (such as Ritalin) which can have long lasting detrimental effects, and Alouette Addictions is trying to educate against over-medication of children. They have three workers in schools, but he noted even if they had three times as many, there would still be work to do.

Doug is pleased that so far there has been no Covid19 infections among their staff, and that they are opening an isolation facility in a local hotel for persons in need of that service. Unfortunately, opioid drug overdosing and homelessness is a continuing problem, and has not gone away at all during this virus crisis.

The staff at Alouette Addictions are maintaining client contacts, especially by social distancing "face-to-face" walks, especially with children and teens.

The staff at Alouette Addictions receive training in addiction counselling. They have outreach workers, nurses, medical assistance, and the services of two doctors.

**Ineke Boekhorst** mentioned the BIA's "Clean Team" which is a very positive program partnering with Alouette Addictions. A small group of people who have had addiction or homeless difficulties hit the streets and clean up messes from the night before, including clothes, garbage and needles that are often found downtown. While the cleanup duties are unpaid, participants get honorarium incentives.

It was noted that our President Adrienne was on the Alouette Addictions board for about 9 years before taking a leave because of her Rotary duties.

Our guest **Mark Stewart** said that he Salvation Army is lucky to be able to work hand-in-hand with Alouette Addictions Services. He noted that the Salvation Army delivered 5,000 pounds of food to schools in the last month. "We feed the bellies, and Alouette Addictions feed the soul", he remarked.


## **Happy and Sad Dollars**:
