OUR CLUB LAST WEEK'S MEETING:

President Clinton Callison presided.

Program: RCMP Constable Cory Russell - Uniformed Community Response Unit (UCRS)

About our guest speaker: Constable Russell has been with the RCMP in Maple Ridge for 4 years now. He started off in general duty, and then went to the traffic safety division, and now is with the UCRS. Prior to joining the RCMP and moving from Ottawa to British Columbia, Constable Russell was involved in community



matters, and was a Big Brothers volunteer, and was also a volunteer helping out with shelters for the homeless.

What does the Uniformed Community Response Unit do? The Uniformed Community Response Unit is composed of regular members of the RCMP. They are the team that is responsible for high visibility in the downtown core, a unit that helps coordinate a plan for people with mental health issues, and liaising with youth in our community. They utilize a collaborative approach with community partners to solve on-going safety concerns/problems, including repeat calls for service. Says Constable Russell, "we are proactive; we try to stop crime before it happens."

The Uniformed Community Response Unit deals with the following issues:

Issues in Maple Ridge / Pitt Meadows


- Homelessness (Maple Ridge Specifically)
- Addiction (Maple Ridge Specifically)
- Unemployment with the Pandemic
- Petty crime rates

(i.e. Theft from Auto, thefts, etc.) Constable Russell says that members of the



UCRS go to the homeless centres and the Caring Place and try to work with others in dealing with homelessness and addiction, which often includes people with mental health problems. The Covid pandemic has produced significant unemployment, which increases the stress and anxiety for a lot of people, and the RCMP receive a lot of mental health calls.

Constable Russell explained that these charts show the monthly comparison of reported petty property crime. The RCMP acknowledges that this crime hits ordinary working people, and they are trying to reduce the incidence of crime in Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows.

Constable Russell has taken part in **Cops for Cancer**, which is a program launched in partnership between police officers and other first responders across the country and the Canadian Cancer Society, to support children and families affected by childhood cancer. The inception of this program began with one police officer and has been growing rapidly amongst communities across Canada. Since 1997, the program has raised over \$42 million to fund life-saving paediatric cancer research and support programs. Constable Russell noted that, last year alone, the program raised over \$700,000. As one of the largest funders of paediatric cancer research in Canada, it has contributed to paediatric cancer survival rates which have increased from 71% in the 1980s to over 83% today.

RCMP in BC Safe Place is an initiative that sees businesses commit to becoming a shelter for people who are at risk of being harassed because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. A sticker in the window indicates a place where they will be welcomed, where they can call police, and wait until officers arrive.

Pack the Cruiser - a police cruiser is packed with donations of food for delivery to the local food bank.

ICBC Events - partnering with ICBC, the RCMP and ICBC personnel make presentations in schools, explaining to students such things as the process to get a drivers license, and the types of demerit points and fines which may be issued for bad driving, as well as safety issues.

MRSS Toy Drive - they work with the Maple Ridge secondary school aboriginal leadership team and collect toys for delivery to needy families and the food bank.

Constable Russell hoped that the Uniformed Community Response Unit could partner with the local Rotary Clubs on some of the Rotary initiatives (listed above), and invited us to contact him if we wish to team up with his Unit with respect to these or any other matters.

Questions from the floor:

Ineke Boekhorst (of the Downtown Maple Ridge Business Improvement Association) and Lynda Lawrence (of Lone Star Management Limited - which manages properties in the downtown core and runs the municipal parking lots) both stated that, from their observations, the crime rate is up in the downtown core, and small businesses are having a very difficult time dealing with it; that there are significant drug and mental health issues which cause these problems; and that many businesses just don't bother to report the crimes to the RCMP anymore as they feel it results in too much red tape and little or slow response from the detachment. Constable Russell stated he appreciated their feedback, and would convey it back to the RCMP. He also stated that the RCMP are now doing police "walk arounds" or foot patrols in the downtown area, and now have an online reporting capability which is easy and fast to use. If this online reporting were used, it would give the RCMP better access to crime statistics.

Rotaract - Rotary Calendar

Sharon Kyle reported that she received an email from Phoenix MacLaren of the **Fraser Valley Rotaract Club** who advised that they have made up a Rotary Themed Calendar which is on sale for \$25 in order to raise money for the Rotaract initiatives. Sharon said she would email all members with the information, and hopes that we will support this young group of future Rotarians.

Happy and Sad dollars

Laurie Anderson said that he appreciated the Remembrance Day program put on by Roger Powley at our last meeting, and upon hearing that the two uncles of Brenda Jenkins who became casualties of World War II, at the ages of 22 and 23 respectively, are the same ages of Laurie's grandchildren, it brought home in a personal way the message of just how young a lot of the soldiers were, who gave their lives in the service of our country.

Laurie also noted that the power went out in his neighbourhood in Pitt Meadows and that he therefore missed Constable Corey Russell's presentation. [However, if any of us are unable for any reason to attend a meeting, note that Rotary meetings on Zoom are now recorded for our later listening pleasure!] Libby, who also lives in Pitt Meadows, when asked about her situation, responded with the double entendre: "Oh, my power is out, believe me!" **Ineke Boekhorst** mentioned our annual Christmas Plants for Starfish Packs sale.

As each year, every single penny we raise will be used for food in our Starfish Packs, so please be generous. Presently serving 120 hungry local kids every weekend in 15 local schools; we cannot
