ROTARY INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

A number of significant changes regarding attendance, meeting cancellations, classifications and other rules of conduct were brought about by this council, which convened in Chicago late April of this year.

Some of the following changes are worthy of discussion at our club level

The board can now cancel up to 4 mtgs. / year, provided no more than 3 consecutive mtg. cancellations Club boards can determine the situation in which a member's absence is excusable and therefore absence does not count as non-attendance (The individual not considered being on attendance list/leave of absence) There are now only 2 categories of membership: ACTIVE and HONORARY

There are no limits to the number of individuals that can be members within the same classification, within a designated club

Members from one club can now have their membership transferred to another , provided the club the member is seeking transfer to accepts the individual

CLUB MEMBER PROFILE - GUESS WHO IS THIS BABY?

Where and from whom did I come from? My father was born in the USA in 1897, and his other's family lived there since the early 1700's. My great great grandmother, as a young pioneer child, traveled west in a covered wagon. My paternal grandfather was a stone mason and emigrated from Scotland. My mother was born one of 11 children in the fishing town of Grimsby, England. At age 23 in 1926, she booked steerage to follow two of her sisters to Alberta in the hopes of greater opportunities in Canada, much to the consternation of her parents and 8 remaining younger siblings whom she left behind. My parents had a full half-dozen kids. I was always glad they had six, because I was the youngest in the family. After my birth, my mother called it quits, either because I weighed in at 10 pounds or because my father died about a year later - I'm not sure which, but both could have been a contributing factor. Until age 8, I lived in an Alberta prairie town of 2,000 people,



and have only happy memories of a carefree childhood, collecting the chicken eggs or fishing in a near-by steam with a stick, some string and a bent straight-pin (oblivious, at the time, to the fact that I was catching fish with an oxymoron and not just a worm)

Due to my father's years of ill-health and untimely death, my dear mother was living in difficult financial circumstances, so in 1951 she again transplanted her family roots in the hopes of greater opportunities for her young family, accepting my aunt's invitation (bless her soul) to stay in her house near the Kitsalano beach until mother and family could find a place of her own. As an 8-year old who had never previously traveled more than 20 miles from home or seen a mountain. I remember Vancouver in the 50's as a wondrous place, and indeed it was, especially in the summer when my family could go for free to Kitsalano beach and watch the "Show Boat" or make a bonfire on the beach and fish for smelts with a net in English Bay. When I was 13, we moved to east Vancouver where I attended Vancouver Tech High School, and then on to UBC. At the age of 22, I married a gal named Lorna (July 27th is our 36th anniversary), and then entered law school, had two kids, graduated, and moved to Pitt Meadows (in that order). At law school, I took criminal law, but had no intention of practicing criminal law so didn't pay much attention to it. So of course, the first job I had as a lawyer in Maple Ridge from 1970 to 1975 was as the local criminal prosecutor. Despite the lawyer jokes, I am very glad to be a lawyer as the job has always been very interesting and people -oriented. Over the years, I have practiced in many areas of the law, both as a barrister and as a solicitor, although I currently practice only as a solicitor, limited primarily to company law and wills and estates. (Some may say I still practice every day in the hope that one day I may get it right).

Lorna and I have enjoyed traveling to many places in the world. Our most memorable trips were to Africa and Egypt. I was lucky to be with one of the first groups to travel throughout China in 1978, shortly after China again opened its doors to visitors following the end of the Cultural Revolution in the 60's and 70's which had closed down that country to western visitors. I later sent Lorna on a hike in Tibet (but she came back). My son Stephen is a realtor in Maple Ridge (got a house to sell?? Oops, sorry Ken and Irena!) and my son Jordan works for a local packaging company. I also have two "great" grandchildren who give us much joy. Guess who I am, and you know who the baby in this picture is!
