- Conduct a '2x4' (Present 2 minutes of Rotary information 4 times per month)



A SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM RI PRESIDENT RICHARD D. KING TO THE ROTARY CLUB OF NEW YORK

On behalf of 1.2 million Rotarians in 163 countries of the world, I want to extend my heartfelt condolences to the victims and families of the tragic events of 11 September 2001. At this early stage, we do not yet know what losses our own Rotary family may have experienced, but I am quite certain that all Rotarians stand united in offering sympathy and support in these difficult times.

Since this tragedy occurred in the country where our world headquarters is located, Rotary International has received an outpouring of concern from Rotarians throughout the world. To share these concerns and condolences with other members of the Rotary family, we have put these messages on our Web site. This Web page will remain on the site permanently to allow Rotarians to respond to the future disasters that seem almost inevitable in our troubled world.

Many Rotarians have asked us how they can help. We strongly encourage Rotarians to turn to their own individual clubs or local districts for guidance. SEPTEMBER – NEW GENERATIONS MONTH

September is New Generations Month and Rotary International sponsors many different programs for youth all over the world. The one most familiar is probably the Rotary Youth Exchange program. Each year about 7,000 young people, ages 15 to 19, participate in this program. This program is sponsored by local Rotary Clubs and relies heavily on host families for success. The experience is enriching for students, families and the host Club. There are two principal types of exchanges:

- **Long-term:** this usually lasts for an academic year and the student attends a local school while living with host families.
- Short-term: varies from a few day to several weeks and frequently happen when school is not is session and do not include an academic program. Accommodations vary form host families to youth camps, attended by students from any different countries.
- **Student Selection** is an important part of the program. Mature and responsible students are selected for the exchanges and selection is generally based on the following criteria:

Scholastic record, Linguistic ability, Community involvement, Potential as cultural ambassador, and Age. Meadow Ridge Club has had the privilege to host several students and this year we are taking a break to regroup and possibly sponsor a student next year. **Submitted by Caro O'Kennedy**

2 X 4 = 2 MINUTES OF ROTARY INFORMATION 4 TIMES PER MONTH

This was last week's 2 X 4 : Standard Rotary Club Constitution

Rotary International is the most territorial organisation in the world. It exists in 159 countries and cuts across dozens of languages, political and social structures, customs, religions and traditions. How is it

that all of the more than 29,000 Rotary clubs of the world operate in almost identical style? The primary answer is the Standard Rotary Club Constitution.

One of the conditions to receive a charter to become a Rotary club is to accept the Standard Club Constitution, originally adopted in 1922. The Standard Club Constitution outlines administrative techniques for clubs to follow in holding weekly meetings, procedures for membership and classifications, conditions of attendance and payment of dues, and other policies relating to public issues and political positions. This constitutional document provides the framework for all Rotary clubs in the world. When the Standard Club Constitution was accepted, it was agreed that all existing clubs could continue to follow their current constitution. Although most of those early clubs have subsequently endorsed the Standard Club Constitution, a few pre-1922 clubs still conduct their club affairs according to their former constitutional provisions.

The Standard Club Constitution has to be considered one of the great strengths of Rotary to enable the organisation to operate in so many thousands of communities.
