VOCATIONAL SERVICES

A Career Awareness weekend camp, Introduction to Paramedic Training, sponsored by our Rotary Club, was held October 26-October 29, 2001 at Planet Ice and the new Library and included a field trip to the BCAS Regional Communications Center in Vancouver. A total of 19 local students (from Garibaldi, Thomas Haney, MRSS, Westview and Pitt Meadows) completed this program successfully. This work experience program was offered to students with a genuine



interest in Paramedics as a potential career and students had to complete a substantial application sheet. Some of the criteria to be met:

- a genuine interest in pre-hospital care
- 16 to 18 years of age at time of application
- have to have good standing in all classes
- good attendance record
- display a willingness to work
- complete the application in full
- been recommended by school staff
- be physically and medically fit and a non-smoker

Some of the areas covered during the 4 day extensive training included: basic anatomy and physiology, patient assessment and patient assessment with critical interventions, treatments (fracture management, burns, soft tissue injuries and drug overdose), general drug awareness (a paramedic's perspective), CPR registration, simulations, 4 hour tour of BCAS Reg. Comm. Ctr. and at the end of the 4th day, testing and....Graduation! To follow at later dates individual BCAS ride alongs will be organized. All training was done by Terry Hissup, a professional Paramedic Trainer employed with the B.C. Ambulance Service.

The 4 day Camp was organized by Andrea Vevers and the Vocational Services Team in conjunction with School District 42, the total cost to our Club approx. \$1500.= covered by Bingo funds (upon approval of the Gaming Committee) A fantastic initiative of our Rotary Club, one we can be very proud of!

This was last week's 2 X 4 : RI WORLD HEADQUARTERS

L The headquarters of Rotary International always has been in the area of Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A.

First it was in Chicago itself, but in 1954 an attractive new building opened in suburban Evanston. The Ridge Avenue building met the needs of the Rotary Secretariat until the 1980s when the addition of new programs, the growth of The Rotary Foundation, and the new PolioPlus activities made the headquarters building extremely crowded and required some staff members to be housed in supplementary office space nearby.

When a modern 18-story office building became available in downtown Evanston in 1987 it appeared to meet all of Rotary's space and expansion needs for years to come. The glass and steel structure, built in 1977, provides 400,000 square feet of office and usable space. The building was purchased by Rotary International, which leases approximately two-thirds of the space to commercial tenants, until needed by future Rotary growth.

The building provides a 190-seat auditorium, large parking garage and 300-seat cafeteria, as well as functional office space for the 400 employees of the World Headquarters. The executive suite on the 18th floor includes conference rooms for the RI board and committee meetings, in addition to the offices for the RI president, president-elect and general secretary. One Rotary Center, as it is called, will enhance the efficient operations of Rotary International for many years to come.
