The Mission of the Rotary Foundation

Dear Rotarians:

Our Foundation was established in 1917 as an endowment fund representing Arch Klumph's legacy. It was named "The Rotary Foundation" by the 1928 convention and in 1931 was organized as a trust. In 1983, it was established as a not-for-profit corporation under the laws of the state of Illinois.



The objective of the Foundation is "the furthering of understanding and friendly relations between people of different nations through the fostering of tangible and effective programs of a philanthropic, charitable, educational, or other eleemosynary nature."

To achieve this objective, however, we need a "mission statement" expressing the purpose of our organization. The mission of The Rotary Foundation is "to support the efforts of Rotary International in the fulfillment of the Object of Rotary, Rotary's mission, and the achievement of world understanding and peace through local, national and international humanitarian, educational, and cultural programs."

This mission was modified in February 1999 by a decision of the trustees in order to provide more opportunities for funding different programs requested by Rotarians. The inclusion of the words "local" and "national" were relevant for approving new programs at these levels and accomplishing the objective of the organization.

But this is the written word, the cold and static side of our Foundation's mission. What is lacking in this definition is the image of the men and women of Rotary as they carry out this mission by way of their contributions and efforts, as well as the emotions that move them to take necessary risks and remain ever watchful.

The lifeblood of The Rotary Foundation has always been the enthusiastic support of Rotarians voluntarily and generously giving of their time and financial resources. It is this support that has made possible the varied educational and humanitarian programs of The Rotary Foundation. These programs give Rotarians a sense of great satisfaction and fulfillment, and reinforce the powerful network that links Rotarians in local, national, and international service. The Rotary Foundation focuses its strength and resources to bring harmony and friendship to mankind and to bring understanding among nations to achieve universal peace.

This is the living, real, and true story of the objective of The Rotary Foundation that finds its concrete expression in the small-, medium-, or large-scale works and projects that Rotarians undertake all over the world. It is our daily duty and our ongoing contribution to achieving peace and understanding among the peoples of the world as we aspire to make harmonious coexistence among nations a reality, something so very urgent and necessary now and in the time ahead.

Thus, in order to achieve our Foundation's mission, every Rotarian must become a "missionary of peace and hope" for all people. Through the programs we support we will be able to make Arch Klumph's dream of "doing good in the world" come true.

This was last week's 2 X 4 : More Rotary Firsts

- Rotary became bilingual in 1916 when the first club was organised in a non-English-speaking country Havana, Cuba.
- Rotary established the "Endowment Fund" in 1917, which became the forerunner of The Rotary Foundation.
- Rotary first adopted the name "Rotary International" in 1922 when the name was changed from the International Association of Rotary Clubs.
- Rotary first established the Paul Harris Fellows recognition in 1957 for contributors of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.
- The Rotary club which first held meetings on a weekly basis was Oakland, California, the Number 3 club.
- The Rotary emblem was printed on a commemorative stamp for the first time in 1931 at the time of the Vienna Convention.
- The first Rotary club banner (from the Houston Space Center) to orbit the moon was carried by astronaut Frank Borman, a member of that club.
- The first Rotary International convention held outside the United States was in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1921.
- The first head of state to address a Rotary convention was U.S. President Warren G. Harding in 1923 at St. Louis.

CLUB MEMBER PROFILE - GUESS WHO IS THIS BABY?

But together we of course like to dance and camping and to visit the grandkids and their parents.
