Presidential Appeal to all Rotary Clubs for Humanitarian Relief for Afghan Refugees

Other than the communications you've received this year concerning membership growth and extension, this letter may be the most important humanitarian appeal I will write as your President of Rotary.

We have received urgent appeals for help for the refugee children of Afghanistan. While millions of dollars have been raised for the victims of New York, there are thousands of other innocent victims, most of them children living in crowded tents, and with winter already upon them, the possibility of death from starvation, thirst, exposure and disease is serious. Many are sick, and in human terms, they feel humiliated and abandoned.

Neighbouring countries have set up emergency camps and are struggling to provide Afghan refugees with the basic amenities such as food, shelter, and clothing. All are facing an uncertain future. A letter I recently received from Pakistan expressed the grave situation and the immediate need for aid:

"With the onslaught of war and winter the victims especially elderly, the women and the children need help. To alleviate the suffering of humanity to fight against hunger and to protect the health of these refugees an international effort is needed."

I am writing to you today to provide you with an opportunity through Rotary to make a significant contribution toward alleviating this major humanitarian crisis.

A Rotary International Notice of Disaster has been issued for District 3270 in Pakistan. An account has been set up to collect funding for Afghan refugee aid and relief projects, to be overseen by District 3270's Disaster Relief Committee. Rotary clubs and individuals who wish to help with this urgently important cause may make contributions payable directly to Rotary International, earmarked for disaster relief in District 3270, and send them to Northern Trust Bank, P.O. Box 75297, Chicago, IL 60675-5297, USA. One of the best ways you, as district governor, can contribute to this initiative is to donate up to US\$10,000 from your SHARE District Designated Fund allocated to 2001-02 Humanitarian Programs, using the attached form.

As this is a matter of urgency, I ask that contributions to this effort be sent by 31 January 2002. When a child is starving, NOW is the time food is needed. When the child is cold, NOW is the time blankets and warm clothes are needed. There is nothing we can do to make this season of the year more meaningful in our lives than to give NOW. Please ask your Rotary clubs and the members of your district to join us today in this global humanitarian rescue.

Please act on this without delay. Contact your clubs and do whatever you can. As the winter months draw nearer, time is of the essence for the Afghans living in refugee camps. All contributions will go directly and completely toward alleviating suffering among the refugees. It is my hope that with your meaningful and rapid response to this appeal, you will be able to help rebuild the future for hundreds of thousands of innocent people impacted by this crisis.

Let's show the world that for the class in black: Mankind Is Our Business.

⚠ Most Rotarians are successful professional and business executives because they hear opportunities knock and take advantage of them. Once a week the opportunity for Rotary fellowship occurs at each club meeting, but not all members hear it knocking.

The weekly club meeting is a special privilege of Rotary membership. It provides the occasion to visit with fellow members, to meet visitors you have not known before, and to share your personal friendship with other members.

Rotary clubs which have a reputation of being "friendly clubs" usually follow a few simple steps:

- First, members are encouraged to sit in a different seat or at a different table each week.
- Second, Rotarians are urged to sit with a member they may not know as well as their long-time personal friends.
- Third, members invite new members or visitors to join their table just by saying: "Come join us, we have an empty chair at this table".
- Fourth, members share the conversation around the table rather than merely eating in silence or talking privately to the person next to them.
- Fifth, Rotarians make a special point of trying to get acquainted with all members of the club by seeking out those they may not know.

When Rotarians follow these five easy steps, an entirely new opportunity for fellowship knocks each week. Soon Rotarians realise that warm and personal friendship is the cornerstone of every great Rotary club.
