Rotary International President Rick King to launch national polio immunisation day in Abuja and celebrate Rotary's 40th anniversary in Nigeria

(ABUJA, Nigeria — 9 January 2002)

Rotary International President Rick King will join Nigerian President Olusegun Obasanjo in launching a massive effort to immunise 40 million Nigerian children against polio on 11 January 2002.

Members of Nigeria's 153 Rotary clubs will also celebrate the 40th anniversary of Rotary in Nigeria with President King.

Significant progress has been made toward eradicating polio in Nigeria. So far this year, 27 cases of polio have been recorded, compared to 638 cases last year. Nigeria's 2,611 Rotary club members can take credit for much of this success as they have volunteered during National Immunisation Days (NIDs) for more than a decade.

In recognising these extraordinary volunteer efforts, King said, "This volunteer spirit is what enables Rotary to move toward its goal of polio eradication. Thanks to the dedication of Rotary volunteers in Nigeria and world-wide, there soon will be one less threat against the children of the world. I congratulate the Rotary clubs of Nigeria on 40 years of outstanding service."

Since Rotary made eradicating polio its main philanthropic goal in 1985, it has contributed US\$16 million to polio eradication efforts in Nigeria, US\$140 million to eradicate polio throughout the African continent and US\$462 million world-wide.

During the NID, Rotary volunteers will help administer the drops of oral polio vaccine to children, assist parents in getting their children vaccinated, deliver the vaccine to immunisation posts, transport health workers and recruit fellow volunteers to assist during the NID.

The NID will also coincide with Rotary's African Regional PolioPlus Committee Meeting in Abuja, where over 400 members from the region will gather to discuss the status of and next steps to eradicating polio in Nigeria, Africa and world-wide.

Polio eradication is extremely close to completion. In 2000, there were no more than 3,500 cases of polio reported world-wide, a 99 percent decrease from the 350,000 cases estimated in 1988. The poliovirus now circulates in no more than 20 countries, down from 30 in 1999 and 125 in 1988. Once eradicated, polio will be the second disease after smallpox to be eliminated world-wide.

Rotary International is one of the world's first and largest volunteer service organisations with 1.2 million members in 163 countries. Rotary clubs are located in 52 countries in Africa, and there are more than 831 clubs in Africa with almost 20,000 members.

In 1985, Rotary International acted as the catalyst for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative by setting the goal to immunise all the world's children against the disease by Rotary's one-hundredth anniversary in

As the largest private-sector contributor and volunteer arm of the Initiative, Rotary's PolioPlus program has contributed US\$462 million to the protection of more than two billion children in 122 countries. These funds are providing much-needed polio vaccine, operational support, medical personnel, laboratory equipment and educational materials for health workers and parents. By 2005, Rotary's financial commitment will reach US\$500 million.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is spearheaded by the World Health Organisation, Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF).

Rotary club members also initiate community projects that address many of today's most critical issues such as violence, AIDS, hunger, the environment and health care.
