#### 2 X 4 = 2 MINUTES OF ROTARY INFORMATION 4 TIMES PER MONTH

This was last week's 2 X 4: **THE INTERNATIONAL ASSEMBLY**An International Assembly is held each year during February or March to prepare all of the district governors-nominee from around the world for the office they will assume on I July. Accompanied by their spouses, the incoming governors join a host of experienced Rotarian leaders for more than a week of training and motivational sessions. At the assembly they meet the special Rotarian who will serve as RI president during their year as governors and they learn the RI theme for the coming year around which they will build their district's conference.

The first International Assembly was held in Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., in 1919. Later assemblies were held in Lake Placid, New York, Boca Raton, Florida, and Nashville, Tennessee. In recent years the assembly has been held in Anaheim, California. But regardless of the venue, the message on the sign above the plenary hall has remained unchanged for years: "Enter to learn . . . go forth to serve."

#### LAST WEEKS PROGRAM

Tom Saare from Alouette River Management Society presented a short history of ARMS, and then spoke about the present and the future of the society.

The Society was formed in 1993 to look at and steward the health of the river and the watershed. The main objective was the rehabilitation of the waterway because the river was in distress at this time. Increased water flow made it possible to restock the river with Chinook salmon. By 1998 the river was awarded Heritage River status and the Chinook, chum and pinks were back to spawn.

By 1999 Arms received a Sustainability award for the work done with the Alouette. A building was erected and opened on Rivers Day in 1999.

Today ARMS is a broad based society committed to the health of the river. Membership is upwards of 300 and the volunteer work continues in the form of inventory marking, mapping watercourses in the municipality, habitat restoration, public education and watershed works and tours. New to their activities is the Bear Aware Program to educate the public about living with bears in the wild.

The future holds many challenges such as securing adequate funding; focus on land and air pollution, developing new partnerships with all levels of government. The Salmon Enhancement Fund is now defunct and all projects that benefited from this program has to find other sources of funding.

As usual, the program was interesting and informative about local issues. Hats off to Merlyn for the quality and variety of programs she has arranged this year. Thanks you – your efforts are appreciated.

The morning was spent outlining the projected District budget with an eye on maintaining the current limits in this year's budget.

Speaker's talked on the topics: Club Secretaries, Timing for Budget and Committee structure, Ambassadorial Scholarships, Rotoract, Polio Plus and World Community Service and the Rotary Foundation

#### The District Goals for 2002-2003:

- 1. The membership growth challenge is 10% (Net 5 members in each club) with a note that since the membership drive was initiated, Rotary has welcomed 50,000 new members and brought the roster to 1.2 million members world wide. It is the only service club to have registered an increase in membership!!
- 2. The importance of the Rotary Foundation is \$100 US/member achievable. DG Kevin Shaughnessy believes it is.
- 3. District Assembly on April 20, 2002 was discussed with a request that all clubs have at least five members attend. The Club officer and directors should attend.
- 4. The District Conference May 1,2&3,2003 Harrison Hot Springs with Langley Central hosting.
- 5. Youth Encourage every club to send candidates to RYLA, participate in the Student Exchange Program, and get involved in Rotoract and Interact.
- 6. 4 Avenues of Service participate in all 4 Avenues of Service with tasks in each to be completed between July1,2002 and April 1,2003.

Overall I enjoyed the seminar, and look forward to PETS March 21-24,2002. Be prepared for me to be approaching you all for your participation in the coming year.
