LAST WEEKS PROGRAM

We had the distinct privilege of having Shell Busey as our guest speaker last week, so those of you who didn't make the meeting you missed a good one.

Shell has spent 29 years in the renovations/repair industry and has recently opened his own "House Smart Centre" in Burnaby and Surrey. From these locations he operates a referral network of craftsmen and tradesmen totalling over 150 services for the home. He personally certifies his members and removes them from his referral list if there are any problems. He does 1,000 referrals per month over the telephone and countless others over the internet. The service is no charge to the consumer as the costs are all borne by the membership through their membership fees. "As it should be" says Shell. He also feels quite strongly that the consumer should not be paying an entrance fee to attend a home show where you have a mixture of craftsmen and sales pitchers for various products. He also expressed the opinion that these shows should be about home repairs / renovations as this is what the consumer is going for.

Shell believes in providing education to people as a lot of money and time could be saved if the consumer just understood the true nature of his/her problem. Quite often the problem can be solved without costly repairs.



In 1978 Shell was approached by the Rafe Maer show to be a guest speaker on his radio show for home renovations week. The telephone board lit up and he was asked to come back once a month. From there the rest is history, Shell now does his own shows on CKNW, one at 5AM on Saturday and another from 8:30-11AM on Sunday.

Rotaract: Building a water park

The Rotaract Club of Prince George, British Columbia, Canada, turned an old wading pool in Fort George Park into an imaginative, eye-catching water park with water cannons, spray guns, in-ground sprinklers, archway sprays, a spiral spraying tunnel, and other play elements — a major six-year-long project.

The city of Prince George provided C\$50,000 for the project, but the Rotaract club obtained all the rest of the budget — more than \$180,000 — through activities designed by its fundraising committee.

Corporate sponsorship packages offered businesses the opportunity to donate \$500-\$20,000 in return for levels of acknowledgment and media recognition. A plaque campaign encouraged community members to purchase puzzle-piece-shaped plaques for \$50 each, which were placed at the water park. The community grew excited as local newspapers and radio stations promoted the 5 June 2001 opening of the wheelchair-accessible, safe water park. The opening ceremony paid tribute to David Ferris, a past Rotaract club president and major force behind the project, who died in a 1998 car accident. Because of the hard work and determination of Ferris and the Rotaract Club of Prince George, families will continue to enjoy the popular water park.
