Scott to head polio eradication fundraising campaign

Past RI Vice President Robert Scott of Cobourg, Ontario, Canada, has agreed to serve as director of the polio eradication fundraising campaign (PEFC) as a volunteer without compensation. Past governor of District 7070, Scott is a retired physician who has been actively involved in Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio worldwide. He is chairman of the RI Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force.

Scott's appointment came by a unanimous decision of The Rotary Foundation Trustees during their October meeting at World Headquarters. He succeeds former General Secretary Herbert Pigman who resigned as director of the PEFC for health reasons.

"Bob's knowledge of polio, his dedicated service to Rotary, and his medical background are terrific assets as we endeavour to Fulfill Our Promise- Eradicate Polio," said Trustee Chairman Glen Kinross. In order to help address urgent needs in the efforts to eradicate polio, Rotary's polio eradication fundraising campaign seeks to raise US\$80 million in cash and commitments by 30 June 2003. Donors will have until 30 June 2005 to complete commitments and pledges made this year. Rotarians and clubs are strongly urged to make their commitment in the near future to allow the campaign to assess progress. 
Immunization efforts in Africa target more than 80 million children

Immunization efforts in 16 African nations targeting more than 80 million children under age 5 are helping to shrink the reservoir of the poliovirus on the continent.

More than nine million children were immunized during a just-completed three-phase polio vaccination drive in the eastern region of the Democratic Republic of Congo, according to the World Health Organization. Rotary has contributed more than US\$12.2 million to date for polio eradication efforts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. No cases of polio have been confirmed in the country since 2000. In West Africa, the second round of synchronized National Immunization Days in 15 nations is scheduled to take place 9-15 November with the goal of vaccinating 70 million children. The countries participating in this week's regional effort are: Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape-Verde, Gambia, Ghana, Guinea Bissau, Guinea Conakry, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, Sierra Leone, and Togo.
