# A Message from RI President Bhichai Rattakul

Dear fellow Rotarians,

In 1921, the Rotary Convention at Edinburgh, Scotland, instituted international service as part of the Object of Rotary. In response, founder Paul Harris declared, "Yesterday our Rotary was a child. Today, in strength and vigour, it steps out into the world."

As we celebrate World Understanding Month in February, let us remember those prophetic words. Rotary's strength lies in the fact that its members look beyond themselves and their borders to serve humanity. International service offers so many opportunities to make a difference, whether it's supporting a Youth Exchange student, sponsoring a Rotary World Peace Scholar, contributing to the polio eradication fundraising campaign, or implementing a World Community Service project. Many Rotarians have told me that they did not truly understand the meaning of Rotary until they participated in an international project. The experience added a whole new dimension to fellowship, understanding, and service.

One of RI's most popular programs is World Community Service (WCS), which has been described as the "quiet revolution of hope." Each year, Rotary clubs provide an estimated US\$26 million in funds and supplies. The WCS program matches countries in need of assistance with those willing to provide resources and funds. The online WCS Projects Exchange database lists projects to help facilitate the process.

World Understanding Month is an opportunity for Rotarians to establish relationships and projects with clubs in other countries. In these turbulent times, it is more important than ever to Sow the Seeds of Love and promote international understanding.

My dream is that Rotary becomes a major force for peace. Rotary Youth Exchange students, Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotary Volunteers, and Group Study Exchange teams all contribute to global understanding. Our newest initiative, the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution, offers two-year graduate programs for scholars to study international relations, mediation, and conflict resolution (see page 27). I also encourage Rotarians at the grassroots level to serve as ambassadors for peace, as they meet with their counterparts in other countries.

More than 80 years after the Edinburgh convention, international service continues to serve as the foundation for some of Rotary's most popular and enduring programs. I will never forget the words of Dr. Noboru Iwamura of Japan, who was the first recipient of the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace in 1981: "Go to the people; live among the people; learn from the people; plan with the people; work with the people. Start with what they know; build on what they have."

Rotarians around the world are doing just that. They are working through Rotary and its Foundation to improve the human condition and provide hope to the hopeless. International initiatives such as PolioPlus will change the course of history. Through our humanitarian work, Rotarians will leave a lasting legacy. We will continue to Sow the Seeds of Love in our quest for health, peace, and stability. We will continue to step out into the world and make a difference.

Our guest speaker was Fellow Rotarian Georgina Patko. Her topic was Junior Achievement and it was evident that this is her passion. The company started in 1955 and its goals are to inspire and mentor children who are interested in business. In the past a business member came in to mentor the children to make, sell and market a product. The results are an understanding of teamwork, and elevated leadership skill level and knowledge about marketing, financing and business endeavours in general.

Georgina became involved with this program after many years of teaching in England, New Brunswick, Yukon and British Columbia. The organization is an international non-profit organization focused on economic and business education to our youth.

While in the past the organization recruited youth that were already interested in business as a potential future, they now work hard to attract students within the school system, who may not have this initial interest due to their circumstances. They begin with grade 5 students and continue through to grade 12. Last year 24,000 students in BC, primarily in the Lower Mainland were exposed to their program.

They still use volunteer business people who are willing to work with a teacher to present this program. They provide training, a script and a connection with an interested teacher. They do approximately 200 units per school year, however they do need more exposure in our area.
