LAST WEEKS MEETING

Last weeks guest speaker, Jennie Bedford, is a very courageous lady, who was struck by polio at age 4. She recovered completely from the decease, only to be infected in later life by the after effects of polio.

With the introduction of the Salk vaccine in 1955, most people thought that they had seen the last of polio.

Since then, the majority of men and women who survived the disease have led full and productive lives. Polio has been forgotten. But now, a growing number of people who had polio in the past are experiencing new symptoms.

- Unaccustomed fatigue
- Reduced endurance
- New Joint and muscle pain
- Muscle weakness
- Trouble sleeping, or waking feeling unrested
- Respiratory problems
- Difficulty swallowing food, frequent choking
- Feeling cold where others are warm, sometimes accompanied by a burning pain, pins and needles sensation
- Emotional stress

The late effects of polio and post-polio syndrome are the names given to

new health problems affecting individuals who contracted poliomyelitis earlier in their lives.

Sadly, many polio survivors dismiss the first signs and symptoms of post-polio syndrome as a normal part of the aging process and do not seek medical attention until the symptoms are more severe. Many health care professionals today have never experienced a polio outbreak and have had few, if any, polio survivors as patients.

ROTARACT HOCKEY POOL

The purpose of this hockey pool is to raise funds too purchase a digital camera for the Lower Fraser Valley Rotaract Club. We feel this is a worthwhile investment because as a club we could like to remember our accomplishments and demonstrate



what Rotaract is doing in the community. These photos would be put onto the website for everyone to learn about Rotaract.

Here are the logistics. Participants will select 16 players from the attached list. Of the top scoring leaders for the 2002-2003 season a person may only select 2 of the top 5 forwards and 3 of the remaining forwards ranked 6-15. You will only select 1 of the top 5 defensemen. You will have 10 forwards in total 5 defensemen in total, one goaltender, and you will also choose your team. For the forwards and defensemen points are awarded for the goals plus assists.
