A Message from RI President Bhichai Rattakul



Dear fellow Rotarians,

Our founder, Paul Harris, was a great proponent of peace and international understanding. He had a vision of how ordinary people could achieve extraordinary goals. Paul felt that one of the most effective ways to promote peace was to carry out humanitarian service projects that relieve human suffering and want. In his words: "Rotary is an integrating force in a world where forces of disintegration are all too prevalent."



Indeed, Rotarians have shown their commitment to world peace from the beginning. They have helped war refugees, provided disaster assistance, established "peace parks," and promoted international exchanges. In 1945, Rotarians played a key role in forming the United Nations. Forty-nine Rotarians attended the UN Charter Conference as delegates. Past RI Vice President Carlos P. Romulo of the Philippines served as the fourth president of real Assembly, and His Royal Highness Past District Covernor Prince Wan of Theiland served

the UN General Assembly, and His Royal Highness Past District Governor Prince Wan of Thailand served as assembly president in 1956.

In 1946, Rotarians were also instrumental in establishing UNESCO (United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization). Today, RI holds the UN's highest nongovernmental consultative status. RI appoints representatives to UNESCO, the UN Environment Programme, the UN Human Settlements Programme, and other UN agencies.

Our most successful collaboration to date has been with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and other partners working to eradicate polio by 2005. Rotarians have risked their lives to deliver vaccine in regions of conflict.

I have served in many roles over the years, including politician and UN delegate. I am convinced that organizations such as Rotary will be the key to long-term peace. Rotary programs such as Ambassadorial Scholars, Group Study Exchange, Rotary Volunteers, and Youth Exchange promote international understanding. Our latest initiative, the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution, is educating tomorrow's peacemakers and diplomats. The first class of 70 scholars will graduate in 2004. It is vital that we continue to support this landmark program, especially during its early stages.

Each of us can make a difference in laying the foundation for peace. We represent 165 countries, speak dozens of different languages, and hold a wide range of religious beliefs. In these troubled times, we must redouble our efforts to bridge the gaps that so violently divide countries, races, cultures, religions, and ethnic groups. We must focus not on our differences but on our shared human condition.

Paul Harris once said, "Rotary is a microcosm of a world at peace, a model which nations would do well to follow." We can all serve as ambassadors of peace at the grassroots level. Together, let us *Sow the Seeds of Love* so that peace will grow and flourish throughout the world.

Mary reported that the Youth in Rotary have been meeting on a weekly basis and they will have a display area in our Home Show booth.

Dot updated us re the Social committee. Unfortunately there were not enough interested people for the horse races in May so perhaps we'll try again later. The committee will assist in setting up the Frisbee Golf, Golf Tournie, and Marco's summer BBO.

Spencer Levan and Jerry Ramak from the Ridge Meadows Arenas Society came to update us re our upcoming Sports Banquet project of pouring concrete in two of the rinks at the Pitt Meadows arenas. Since the arena has been taken over by the Society they have been hard at work and their efforts are paying off!

They have : instituted the first High School Hockey League on Thursdays after school,

encouraged the Lacrosse league to use their facilities. This alone has helped 680 kids.

They have got figure skating, ringette, roller hockey, men's hockey all back in place

They have 660 kids from a Port Coquitlam league using the facilities.

It is estimated that 8,000-9,000 people use the Ice facilities and with the dry floor we are contributing towards another 3,000-4,000 people should be added. They also hope to open up ice time for seniors free skate and for young children.

All in all it seems to be a very successful volunteer organization, and certainly well worth the support we are giving them.
