



What a glorious evening. We had two speakers on two very divergent topics.

The first speaker was Evan Burgess who works at the Kelowna Public Library. Evan spoke on

how our city library has evolved into a multipurpose library. Sure, it has lots of books, but you can access CDs, DVDs, audio books. printing, scanning, computer access, references and research material including genealogy and local history.

Then there are the non-traditional services such as a library of digital books, Kanopy which is a TV app of independent films, Rosetta Stone that teaches languages, Press Reader that access newspaper and digital publications from around the world and Linked in Genealogy.

Then there are the items such as bird watching kit, radon kit, home energy kit, and even packages of seeds for you to grow.

There is the Makerspace where a technician will help you use equipment such as sewing machines, Cricket Maker that has a cutting arm and even a digitization station.

Finally, you can rent or borrow big and small meeting rooms, programming for adults providing skills in games and language technology and technical help for specific problems.

This is not the library you were shown as a student.

The second speaker, Gem Munroe has devoted his life and career to improving educational opportunities for disadvantaged people across Canada and abroad. Pursuit of this objective carried him into residence in unfortunate communities across most of Canada, before carrying him overseas.

He is presently a Director of Amarok Society, a registered Canadian charity that provides educational programmes to the very poor in Bangladesh and India. As well, Gem is a bestselling author and artist whose new book, *And Where the Wind Spin Them*, follows the epic adventures of a resourceful girl and her courageous little brother who struggle by wit and grit, to overcome the perils and extreme

disadvantages of children born into poverty and ignorance,


For their work, Gem and his wife, Dr Tanyss Munro, were recipients of Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medals.

Gem talked about the problem of trying to educate women in the worst slums in the world so that they can educate their children. It's not an environment where you "build them a school and they will come" does not work. It's a place where only one out of three children get any education at all. One Turkish Ambassador said it's the "only country that made me cry."

Facing threats from local strongmen and husbands and having to deal with religious differences they found their approach only works in villages. Essentially the mother who has a desire to learn goes to school, where she learns not only how to use a pencil but acquires a vocabulary of about 600 words and arithmetic literacy and well as health, hygiene, birth control and conflict resolution relating to 'power of content' (I'm going to leave this for you to look up on the internet yourself). Then she goes home and must teach what she learns to at least five children.

The entire presentation was the complete antithesis to life as we know it. Gem did summarize the entire moment by saying human have a natural desire to learn but if this is frustrated, this leads to frustration and depression. Their goal is to begin the transformation from pessimism and despair to optimism and hope.
