Kelowna Area Forest Fire -



Just a short update. The three fires in the Grouse Complex are still burning and under differing stages of control. The temperature has dropped, and the relative humidity increased but there still has been little precipitation in the area. The last count of lost and damaged structures was 189 but fire officials expect that to rise to near 200 before it is all over. **Annual Dues –** The Board of Directors has set this year's annual dues at \$260. GUEST SPEAKER

No guest speaker this week but the club did have an discussion on what might be the role of Rotary Clubs in future disasters.

The consensus was that Rotary's role lies in the recovery from a disaster whether it be financial help or physical assistance. Certainly, we should approach the emergency services to offer any onsite assistance we can offer but our strength lies in what has to come next.

The response of Rotary to a disaster should be preorganized by the joint clubs in the area. Canadians are community driven; we need to assess what the realistic dangers are and begin to design a response.

It was also noted that Rotary offers an excellent clearing house for clearing donations. Everything operates under the 4-Way Test and is recognized as one of the best charities in the world for how funds are handled and accounted for.

One thing that has been noted with this recent fire event was the emotional toll on people, especially those who have lost everything. A form of PTSD, people have

reacted emotionally to what happened especially those who are experiencing a second time around (2003 fire). Many have decided they feel fine and gone back to work only to find out their head was just not in it.

The need to provide happiness and recovery to people might also lie in the restoration of recreational spaces. Not just houses have been destroyed. All the local parks, gardens and play areas have likely been savaged. Most of these sites will likely fall to the bottom of recovery list for most municipalities.

Finally, we have to accept that three months after the event most people will forget how they felt.
