The 'Save a Rhino Backpack Project' sponsored by the Osoyoos Rotary Club, <u>that</u> <u>you so kindly helped to get going by your donation</u>, is finally complete. All the Camelbak backpacks are now in Kruger National Park, South Africa. We ran into a few obstacles along the way but finally we were able to put all 20 Camelbak backpacks in the hands of the Field Officers. We trust that they can more effectively help stop the pouching of the rhinos.

We obtained all 20 backpacks some time ago and then after trying various ways of shipping them safely to South Africa, we found it best to send them with friends of Rotarians, (namely visiting relatives of some our South African Doctors). Eight backpacks were delivered to the Field Officers and then the last 12 more were on their way but somehow, they were lost between the Kelowna Airport and the Seattle Airport. After lengthy discussions with the airlines and Rotarian, Marieze Tarr's effects, we were compensated for their loss. Eventually the 12 were replaced and were sent again along with some Long Johns and a few helpful supplies.

Shortly after the initial 8 backpacks arrived at Kruger National Park, I received a report that the backpacks had made a difference already. Twelve rhino poachers were arrested and some of the credit goes to the Field Officers wearing our backpacks in the arrest.

It will be interesting to hear how the final 12 more backpacks have helped save some Rhinos. I feel confident they will make a difference too.

I am enclosing a letter and some pictures sent to our Rotary Club, but really you are ones that deserve all the credit and thank you again.

Dear Friends of Houtboschrand,

Due to the intensity of poaching in the Kruger National Park, Field Rangers end up following the tracks of rhino poachers on almost a daily basis. This is especially hard and thirsty work since temperatures can easily reach 45°C in summer. Due to the size of the area, long distances often have to be covered which means that Field Rangers are often required to stay on the tracks for a whole day. The aim of such a tracking exercise is obviously to catch up with the poachers. Time can obviously not be wasted to stop for water breaks and water must be taken in on the move. Previously water was carried in army style water bottles or even normal 2L cool drink bottles. These bottles must however be however taken out of the normal ruck sack first which meant that the patrol must stop.

The need for water bags with a built in reservoir was identified and the Round Table in Canada came to our rescue by raising funds for twenty such bags. It however did not stop there. On our request, funds were raised for twenty Camel Back Mother Load bags, which is not only top of the range and ideally suited for the job, it also carries a life time warranty. Additional funds were also raised to buy some thermal underwear and gloves which in turn plays an important role to maintain morale during night operations in the cold winter months.

It is therefore with great appreciation that I am writing this letter on behalf of the Houtboschrand field staff members that gained from this kind and admirable gesture. I would especially like to thank the members of the Osoyoos Rotary Club who facilitated this effort and of which most donors are members. However, anyone involved in this effort will always be welcome at Houtboschrand Section in the Kruger National Park, South Africa. You will be welcomed with open arms. Thank very much for your effort and contribution from a country as remote as Canada.


