As I put this newsletter together today is the 74th Anniversary of D-Day

On the morning of June 6, 1944, Allied forces staged an enormous assault on German positions on the beaches of Normandy, France. The invasion is often known by the famous nickname "D-Day," yet few people know the origin of the term or what, if anything, the "D" stood for.

"D-Day" was an Army designation used to indicate the start date for specific field operations. In this case, the "D" in D-Day doesn't stand for anything—it's merely an alliterative placeholder used to designate a particular day on the calendar. This shorthand helped prevent actual mission dates from falling into enemy hands, but it also proved handy when the start date for an attack was still undecided. These terms allowed units to coordinate their operations ahead of time even when they didn't know their actual start dates.

Every year, thousands of families from across the interior of British Columbia must travel from their homes in order for a loved one to receive life-saving specialist care at Kelowna General Hospital.

At any given time, one in four hospital beds is occupied by someone from outside the Central Okanagan - more than 100 people each day. All too often, visits are unplanned and increasingly lengthy.


On average, newborns, children and youth spend 10 - 19 nights at KGH. Accommodation for parents and siblings is expensive and, in popular summer months, nearly impossible to find. Research shows that patients heal faster and more effectively when surrounded by their loved ones. And family members bond with others through a shared experience.

Together with the community, KGH Foundation has committed to raising \$8 million to build JoeAnna's House, a home away from home to keep families together when they need it most, within steps of the loved ones' bedside. If you wish to donate individually then make the cheque payable to **Kelowna General Hospital** with **JoeAnna's House – Capri Rotary** written on the memo line. That way our club receives credit towards our commitment.



Corinne Crockett's topic tonight was "Good Grief". That is human grief is shrouded in mystery and misunderstanding. There was a time when people were expected to bury their grief but now society is getting more curious about how we process grief. Corinne summed it up nicely when she said, "Grief is love's twin."

Like love, we experience grief physically, mentally and emotionally. Physically grief brings on tears, fatigue, insomnia and indigestion. Mentally we experience forgetfulness, reduction in comprehension. disassociation, indecisiveness and a fear that we are losing our mind. Emotionally we suffer from fear, anxiety, anger, and guilt which often brings on a discord in the family and a sense of isolation.

Corinne's solutions are not revolutionary. We need to forgive awkward moments and comments, take care of ourselves physically, accept that grief can return out of the blue, avoid major decisions, let people know how they can help. Finally she suggests in holding some form of ceremony despite the wuishes of the deceased. This process is really for the survivors and helps them to move on. Remember they also grief.

The club wasn't finished with Corinne after presenting her with the speaker's pen. She no sooner sat down when Ron called her back to the podium. Here Bob and he presented her with a **Paul Harris Fellowship** for her work in helping people get through their darkest hours.


