She then shared a PowerPoint which reviewed some of her unforgettable experiences as an exchange student over the past year.

During the annual outgoing club president's speech, Craig Garries expressed his appreciation to his executive and board of directors, and the members of his club for enabling him to enjoy a very exciting and memorable year as the club's president, one that he shared that he would be having a difficult time giving up at the end of June. He also reflected on some of the successful projects, events and activities that the club had experienced and congratulated the club for its achievements.

The Installation program came to a conclusion with remarks from the in-coming President Barb Penner. In her address, Penner focused on the Rotary International theme for 2013-14, "Engaging Rotarians, Changing Lives," in particular, expressing just what the theme means for each of us as Rotarians. In reference to the meaning of the theme, Penner noted that Ron Burton, in-coming RI president, shared that our responsibility does not end by asking individuals to become members of Rotary, but instead we should be sharing the experience of Rotary; and most importantly, we should not accept that our job is done until "that new member is engaged in Rotary, inspired by Rotary, and uses the power of Rotary service to change lives," quoting Burton. Penner concluded out that her goal was "to continue to have every Rotarian involved in Rotary," in adherence with this theme.
