Jenelle's Host Town.....


Perched majestically on a rocky promontory overlooking the countryside high above the Marne River on the Plateau de Langres, the town of Langres with a population of 7850 is one of the fifty most beautiful towns of France, with its medieval, Renaissance and classical heritage.

It is situated in the Haute-Marne department of the Champagne-Ardenne region, 35 kilometres south of Chaumont.











The main highlight is the ramparts that surround the town, about 3.5 kilometres long that can be walked around, and including seven fortified towers and seven gateways. Parts of the ramparts date back 2000 years, although some parts are much more recent - for example the citadel dates from the 19th century, and most of the towers date from the 15th-16th centuries.

One can follow the maze of narrow streets and covered passageways and let the town tell you its history. It is Gallo-Roman through its ancient monuments, medieval by the cathedral of Cluniac inspiration and Renaissance as seen in its elegant town houses.
