### OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD Ben Silcox

Ben Silcox is the Program Development Coordinator for Operation Christmas Child. Operation Christmas Child is a main project of Samaritan's Purse. Samaritan's Purse Canada is a non-denominational evangelical Christian organization that has been providing spiritual and physical aid to hurting people since 1970. In his role, Ben works with and supports 500 year round volunteers to promote this amazing project across Canada.

Operation Christmas Child was started in 1990 with a couple in Wales collecting gifts for children in war torn Romania. Since then 86 MILLION shoe boxes have been distributed worldwide.

Because God loves these precious children, He wants us to demonstrate our love to him and others by giving to others. In situations of poverty, there are feelings of hopelessness and feelings of no value. A gift can change this like nothing else can. We want these children to know that they are loved and special and that can make all the difference.

So what goes in a shoebox? Things that we take very much for granted: hygiene items, school supplies, toys, hardy candy, personal note and photo. What not to include are things that can leak, melt, freeze or break, like toothpaste, food and candy that is soft, chewy or crumbly.

There is great power in a simple gift. If you would like to impact the life of a child far away that you don't even know, this is the way to do it. When that innocent child looks at your note and photo, imagine the feeling of joy – that someone far away would want to share a gift with them! And that feeling will be great for you; that you have freely given to change the life of some small child that may never have received a gift.

## The Rotary Foundation

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

In 1917, RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed that an endowment be set up "for the purpose of doing good in the world". In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than US\$5,000, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.

Five Trustees, including Klumph, were appointed to "hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its property . . . as a single trust, for the furtherance of the purposes of RI".

Two years later, the Foundation made its first grant of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into the Easter Seals.

The Great Depression and World War II both impeded the Foundation's growth, but the need for lasting world peace generated great postwar interest in its development. After Rotary's founder, Paul P. Harris, died in 1947, contributions began pouring into Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

That year, the first Foundation program - the forerunner of Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships - was established. In 1965-66, three new programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

The Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants program was launched in 1978, and Rotary Volunteers was created as a part of that program in 1980. PolioPlus was announced in 1984-85, and the next year brought Rotary Grants for University Teachers. The first peace forums were held in 1987-88, leading to the Foundation's peace and conflict studies programs.

Throughout this time, support of the Foundation grew tremendously. Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, it has received contributions totalling more than \$1 billion. More than \$70 million was donated in 2003-04 alone. To date, more than one million individuals have been recognized as Paul Harris Fellows - people who have given \$1,000 to the Annual Programs Fund or have had that amount contributed in their name.

Such strong support, along with Rotarian involvement worldwide, ensures a secure future for The Rotary Foundation as it continues its vital work for international understanding and world peace.
