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Eliese Watson Bart introduced our captive(ating)

Eliese gave us a brief biography of herself, growing up on a farm in the Crossfield area with her own menagerie. She went off to U of C, but missed the farm and the animals and wild life. In searching for something she could have as a pet or a responsibility she discovered that rooftop beehives were "in".

A very enthusiastic speaker, Eliese took us from her one hive, to a larger group of almost 400 roof top hive keepers in the city. Alberta is the fifth largest province but has 789 beekeepers, and 274,600 colonies. These each produce 125 to 200 lbs. of honey annually. A problem for the Alberta keepers is that although we raise 35% of the canola in Canada, the seed producers treat all the seed with "nonicotinoids". This chemical is toxic to the bees and hence many of them die. This makes if very difficult for commercial or large scale apiarists in Alberta.

Hobbyists are taking over the beekeeping industry. They are small enough to withstand losses of a reasonable amount, without being forced into bankruptcy. In the process they are building a sense of community in the beekeeping world, much like the bees do.

Eliese then took us through a six step system of building a community:

- 1.accesible
- 2.forum
- 3. collaboration (amongst hobbyists)
- 4. education and monitoring
- 5. neighbours part of equation
- 6.reliability

She gave us a short course in bee physiology and sexuality, demonstrating her considerable depth of knowledge about all things "bee".




Meeting Minutes

Bees require genetic diversity for the colony to survive. Swarming is one of the methods that allows bees to maintain the diversity of the colony.

Eliese offers a beekeeing certificate and has graduated 400 level one candidates. There is also a 22 week apprenticeship program. The group has monthly field days and potlucks and home to hive bicycle tours. There is also a mentorship program.

An important outgrowth of this community building is that Calgary now has a queen rearing program, the first in 35 years. Normally there are 278,000 queens imported into Alberta.

An aside was that Eliese noted that 80% of the "new" beekeepers were engineers and they were always producing "flow charts" of their hives' production and activity!



Saint Patrick's Day or the Feast of Saint Patrick (Irish: Lá Fhéile Pádraig, "the Day of the Festival of Patrick") is a cultural and religious holiday celebrated annually on 17 March, the death date of the most commonly-recognised patron saint of Ireland, Saint Patrick (c. AD 385–461).

Saint Patrick's Day was made an official Christian feast day in the early seventeenth century and is observed by the Catholic Church, the Anglican Communion (especially the Church of Ireland), the Eastern Orthodox Church and Lutheran Church.
