
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FACTS, FIGURES, STORIES & ANECDOTES Daryl Slade, CFL Historian

Bart introduced our speaker for the day, Daryl Slade who is a CFL historian and statistician. Football has been played since 1891, with the championship game being played amongst Eastern teams until 1911, when Calgary took on and lost to the Eastern winner. It was not until 1929 that the forward pass was allowed and then, with restrictions on when one could be thrown and on how many passes a team could throw in a game. The first forward pass was thrown by a Calgary quarterback during a game in Edmonton.



In 1948 Calgary finally hired Les Lehr as a professional coach, and he brought in a few professional players. This was a very good team, going through the season in the West without losing a single game. They faced Ottawa in the Grey Cup and won. This was the start of the modern era with parades and parties surrounding the big game. The story of a cowboy riding a horse into the Royal York Hotel in Toronto appears to be a fabrication as no solid records can be found.

In the 50's Calgary cut Kwong and Bright, shipping them off to Edmonton with the result that they went on to win several Grey Cups while Calgary sat home and watched.

In the 80's hockey came to the west and football suffered, as it was no longer the only game in town, as fans turned to the hockey teams. The Stampeders went through ups and downs until 2005 when local people took over ownership of the team. (The team is now owned by the Flames.) With good coaching and a solid team, the Stampeders have been a strong contender for several years. This is the year of the Horse and when you read this we will be celebrating a Grey Cup win ... I hope !

President Stephen thanked Daryl for his interesting presentation.

Karla's Kommuniqué

Hello everyone!

Just yesterday I returned from the Berlin tour with my district. From Wednesday to Sunday we explored one of the most interesting German cities laden with historical importance. 32 exchange students in total, we saw Schloss Sans-Souci, the Sony Centre, the East-Side Museum, the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe, the Bundestag, and so much more.

This trip, as well as being a great opportunity for bonding and learning, was also profoundly moving. Standing there in front of painted pieces of the Berlin Wall, or learning about the victims of the Second World War were experiences unlike any others. There are simply no words to describe what I felt. After so much time spent in Ingelheim, Berlin felt a little overwhelming. With the confusing train system, I might have gotten lost a few times. The weather dipped below zero for the first time and all of the South American students were bundled in more jackets than I wear in Calgary!

I've returned home tired but pleased ... I saw all that I could with the time that I had. I feel like not a single moment was wasted. I caught a pretty bad cold which is often the product of being with so many exchange students for a longer period of time. Other than feeling a little under the weather, I'm very happy and eager to return to school.

I received some bad news about soccer. According to international regulations, I won't be able to play in a league while I'm here. Our



head coach is doing everything she can, including contacting some very important names in German soccer, but it's not looking good. I hope I can at least continue training with the team as I've made some very good friends there. I'll keep you updated on that situation.

This next weekend we have our last orientation of the year, and we have the opportunity to meet the German outbounds and tell them about our countries. I am to prepare a presentation entirely in German about Canada and why students should go on exchange there. The German is no longer so daunting, lately I"ve been speaking mostly in German with my host family and friends. What I am a little worried about is what to talk about. I want to talk about the opportunity to improve their English but what if the student gets sent to Québec. Canada is so huge and offers so many things depending on the region you're in. I really don't want to falsely present the country and mislead these eager outbounds. On top of that, students in Germany don't have the option of going to Canada, they only have the option of going to North America, which means they could just as easily be sent to Nebraska even if my presentation is good enough to convince them to go to Canada. If anybody has any tips on what I could talk about, any information about trips that other districts in Canada take, or just any ideas in general please let me know.

I hope everyone is well and that the exchange students back home are thriving too.
