Bart introduced guest speaker Dave Wilder, co-founder of The Big Give Project who agreed at the last minute to speak as the scheduled speaker, Jason Glass, 2013 winner of the Stampede chuckwagon races had to bow out.

Dave thanked Bart for inviting him to speak and recognized the roomful of volunteers by observing that "I feel like I am teaching my Dad how to make babies". Bart had read an item in Metro on the work being done for



the community by The Big Gift Project. Their goals are to support equal opportunity for students to thrive in sports regardless of social ans financial restraints, and to invest in the sports community as a whole through sponsoring school athletic departments and summer camps. They level the playing field in high school and younger sports.

The organization started over a glass of wine, and donations grew over the years from \$50 to as much as \$50,000. They started with jerseys for schools, then started giving tax receipts, became partners with KidSport, and allied themselves with the Calgary Foundation.

The three Pillars of the organization are Baseline (basketballs, uniforms, player fees), Programming (summer camps, club sports, tutors, YMCA memberships, Send-a-Kid-to-Camp), and Infrastructure (finding Champions of their own cause, International Arts Centre). Baseline is all the little things that make sports possible, Programming is what keeps kids interested, and Infrastructure addresses the root problem of a neighbourhood.

The Founders have succeeded because of passion for the cause with daily involvement, rarely say no to a needy child, put fun back into fundraising and push themselves to do more. As they were coaches, they saw the need and no project was too big or too small. They treat donors as customers with lots of

options and ensure they receive more than just a tax receipt. The organization saw a need and created a solution to solve it including accountability to donors. So far this year they have raised about \$350,000 and over \$1million in total so it is no longer a hobby. The very
